VESSEL IN A SAD PLIGHT

Schooner *St. Louis* on the Lake All Night Without a Rudder.

The crew of the schooner *St. Louis*, which lost her rudder near the Duck Islands, as reported in Wednesday's Whig, had a thrilling time. There was quite a heavy sea on at the time, and the vessel was tossed about all Tuesday night, but luckily there were no serious mishaps. About 5 o'clock on Wednesday morning, word was sent to Kingston for help, and the steamer *City of New York* reached the disabled schooner which at this time was lying at anchor off the False Ducks.

The *St. Louis* is now discharging her cargo of coal at the Royal Military College, and will likely be laid up for the season as soon as the cargo is taken off.

The steamer *City of New York*, after towing the schooner *St. Louis* to the Royal Military College wharf, cleared for Oswego.

The schooner *Susie Chipman* arrived from Sodus, with a cargo of coal for Booth & Company.

The schooner *Daryea*, coal-laden from Oswego, is discharging at Anglin's wharf.

The schooner *Katie Eccles* arrived from Sodus, with coal, and is discharging at Portsmouth.

The schooner *Buena Vista* passed on her way up the Rideau Canal last night, with a cargo of 1,000 barrels of apples from Waupoos Island, South Bay, for Ottawa.

WILLIAM CASEY'S ADDRESS.

To Engineering Students on Locomotive Cost Keeping.

Before a large gathering of the Engineering Society of Queen's University on Tuesday evening William Casey, general manager of the Canadian Locomotive Company, gave an interesting and instructive lecture on "Cost Keeping," in connection with the manufacture of locomotives. He first gave a general summary of the different processes in connection with this industry, and then gave a minute description of the accounting system in vogue at the Canadian Locomotive Works.

The speaker explained what is meant by burden, or overhead, expense, and contrasted this with direct expenses. He touched on the effect of productive and non-productive labor in any large factory, and described the method of distribution of cost accounts in the modern efficient office. The speaker was followed with close attention throughout by his audience of students, who derived a great deal of information along these lines from the address.
