Students Volunteer Movement —Medical Supervisor Is Kept Busy.

The programme of the students' volunteer movement at Queen's is an ambitious one and is being started with much enthusiasm. The session's programme was started with the addresses of Professor Morrison and Dr. Fraser Campbell. Discussion groups will meet fortnightly throughout the year and discuss in various student rooms throughout the city, the topics which will be the following week, at union gatherings, discussed by prominent men in the religious life of the university. The group leaders have been appointed as follows: D. K. Faris, J. A. McKinnon, C. C. Gilbert, A. E. Duffield, F. A. Knox and J. T. M. Wilson. Several of these men were in attendance at the Students' Christian Movement Conference at Muskoka and there received inspiration which has led to the formulation of the programme for the year's work. The ladies are also forming study groups. The next speaker before the combined groups will be Professor Matheson.

The men's singles tennis tournament has been advancing to the finals slowly, struggling through wet weather spells and getting ahead when the courts are in good condition. At the present time I. McLachlan, R. M. Maybee and E. L. McLachlan are in the third round, and George Stewart has played into the fourth. The representatives of Queen's at the tourney at McGill could not be picked from the results of the tournament at the college on account of the lateness in getting started, and the early date of the meet, but the players had to be chosen from previous years' experience. It for some time has been noticed that the courts at Queen's are inadequate for the number of students wishing to play and the courts being of grass are at the mercy of the rainy weather. A few years ago when the intercollegiate meet was to have been played at Queen's and the players had to go to McGill in order to get courts on which they would all agree to play, as rainy weather prevailed at the time, clay courts were agitated but so far nothing has materialized.

Campney, president of the alma mater society, who graduated last spring, and is in attendance at the college of education, Toronto. Mr. Campney will give a student's thoughts on religion. A feature of the work around the university buildings this fall has been the gang of men who have been under the direction of J. Bews, supervisor of buildings, keeping the buildings in a condition of repair and making various small additions in the form of cupboards and shelves and doing minor repairs.

The first one is being held this Friday and practically every year in the college will take advantage of bolstering its funds by holding such an event. The three faculty dances and the returned men's ball are the big dances held by the students' societies during the session.

In order to fulfill a long-needed want of bulletin accommodation, at the request of the alma mater society the university authorities are erecting bulletin boards at the corner of University avenue and Union street, in front of Nicol hall, and in front of the old arts building. The college made the request that posters be not put on the trees so the students asked that suitable boards be erected.

The freshman years will be the guests of the various years in arts at their year meetings as is the custom. The years take turn about in being at home to the freshman years, and to each other.

At the meeting of the Levana society, Wednesday afternoon, two debates between the girls of '22 and '23 and '24 and 25 were heard. The juniors and freshettes were the winners and will debate for final honors at a later date.
