### THOMAS A. LOW IS OUT.

He Will Be the Liberal Candidate in South Renfrew.

The nomination was seconded by I. E. Pedlow, representative from this riding in the late Parliament; David Barr, sr., Renfrew, and John Stewart, Waba.

He is prominent in business, and has resided in Renfrew for more than thirty years. He was member of the county council in 1901, and served a term as warden.

In his speech of acceptance, Mr. Low said he stood for a tariff for revenue, and if elected promised to support the efforts to revise the reciprocity agreement with the United States. Sir Wilfred Laurier, he said, took his political life in his hands in 1911 in the interests of the farmers of Canada.

There are now three candidates in the field, Mr. Low, J. H. Findlay, Conservative, and R. G. Wilson, Progressive.
