 This was carried and the council
 adjourned until 9.30 a.m. Thursday.
 The council met again and adjourned
 until Nov. 22nd.

 Hickey, Lanark township. Rev. Pa-
 ther Carey performed the ceremony.

 to the strains of the wedding march
 played by Miss N. Doherty. The
 children's choir rendered a few beau-
 tiful selections during the mass. Miss
 Carmel Murphy, of Brockville, sister
 of the bride, acted as bridesmaid, and
 the groom was assisted by Thomas
 Carberry.

Served With Gen. Macdonell.
 An interesting feature of the visit
 of the French exhibition train to
 Kingston yesterday is that Count
 D'Arnaud, who is in charge of the
 French Mission, and of the train on
 its trip through Canada, served in
 France for some time with Major-
 General Sir A. C. Macdonell, com-
 mandant of the R.M.C.

Senator Beachmen. one of the
 members of the Canadian committee
 of arrangement, was unable to come
 to Kingston with the French mission
 but will rejoin the train at a future
 date. The senator is one of the most
 prominent of those who have taken a
 deep interest in the aim of the
 French government to promote
 and a better knowledge of both their
 own country and Canada.

Branch of French Alliance.
 Many Kingstonsians, interested in
 the work of the "Alliance Francaise",
 have been co-sidering for some time
 the organization in this city of a
 branch of the society. Prof. Vattier,
 of the R.M.C., who has been among
 those most prominent in working to
 this end, states that plans are at last
 beginning to take shape. A prelim-
 inary meeting is to be held at
 Queen's University next Tuesday
 evening when ways and means for
 the inauguration will be discussed.
 Kingston, being a noted educational
 centre, should be able to support a
 very strong branch of this distin-
 guished society, which has for one of
 its objects a closer union and bet-
 ter understanding between the French
 and the British nations. There are
 few places in Canada which have
 greater associations of sentiment and
 French history than our own fair
 city, which was founded as everyone
 knows by the great Frontenac and all
 our traditions point to the fact that
 an organization to develop good feel-
 ing and comradeship between the two
 greatest races, will receive the hearty
 support and co-operation of all
 classes in the community.

No More Girl Bank Clerks.
 With regard to the decision of the
 Canadian banking authorities to re-
 place the girl members of their staffs
 with men as speedily as possible,
 some of the local branch managers
 were interviewed by the Whig, to as-
 certain the effect of this ruling in
 Kingston. Although one or two of
 the banks have laid off some of their
 girl clerks, the intention of the oth-
 ers is to keep them on as long as they
 wish to stay and then replace them
 with young men. The managers are
 agreed that the girls are just as com-
 petent as the men, but the difficulty
 seems to be that they can't be sent
 away from their homes to work in
 some outlying district, which upsets
 the whole scheme of promotion. The
 night work in the bank, which is of-
 ten considerable, is another prob-
 lem. And then as one manager re-
 marked, "The trouble is that the vast
 majority of the girls do not intend
 to follow up the profession more than
 a couple of years or so, and just be-
 gin to be valuable to the bank when
 they come in to me to say they are
 going to be married." The Whig man
 was pondering on the inconsistency
 of women, when the manager added
 as an afterthought, "Though I sup-
 pose one can't blame them for that;
 when they get the chance." The
 manager is a married man.
