CLINIC WILL BE CLOSED IF MONEY IS NOT PAID

Board of Health to Ask Payment of Money Due General Hospital.

The Kingston Board of Health is going after the Ontario government with regard to its refusal to pay a bill of \$1,700 or thereabouts, for the venereal disease clinic maintained at the Kingston General Hospital. This is the hospital's bill for the past year. The Kingston Board undertook, as the government's request, to establish the clinic, the only one in Eastern Ontario, and work has been carried on for a year. One of the original provisions was that a social service nurse was to be engaged, but as Kingston is well provided with social service nurses and the hospital is well-staffed, the engagement of an additional worker was not pressed, nor was one needed. The sum of one hundred thousand dollars, it appears, was set aside by the Dominion government for the work in Ontario, and if the Kingston hospital bill is not soon paid, the Dominion health department, of which Hon. Dr. J. W. Edwards is head, will be asked to make some enquiries at Toronto. It is said that if the Ontario government does not settle up, the clinic here will be closed very soon.

A SYDENHAM BARBER DIES VERY SUDDENLY

Edward Charlton Passed Away on Thursday Night -- He Served Oversets.

(From our own correspondent) Sydenham, Oct. 29.—The community was greatly shocked Thursday night when it became known that Edward Charlton, who conducted a barber shop in the village, had died very suddenly. He had not been in his usual health for some days, but his condition was not considered to be serious. Deceased went overseas with the 146th battalion, and was in France most of the time. He is survived by his widow and three children, Hattie, of Toronto; David and Katie, at home.

The funeral will take place from the home of the deceased on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. George Stafford will have charge of the service.

CITY'S APPEAL DISMISSED

Ontario Railway Board Turned Down Kingston's Petition.

The appeal of the City of Kingston against its assessment for a portion of the cost of 15 3/4 miles of provincial highway was dismissed by the Ontario Railway Board at the close of the evidence on Thursday afternoon. The case was opened by Mr. Agar, counsel for the Ontario government, who read extensively from the highway act relating to cities. No evidence was put in by J. L. Whiting, K.C., solicitor for the city.

Mr. Agar called George Hogarth, highway engineer, who showed that under the suburban road system the city paid 30 per cent., the county 30 per cent. and the province 40 per cent. Now as a provincial suburban road, the city and county each paid 20 per cent., and the province 60. The mileage upon which the assessment is made is less than that of the county suburban roads. It had been 23.6-10 miles and as a provincial suburban road it was 15 3/4 miles. He submitted copies of resolutions passed by the suburban road area commission that had been adopted by the city council.

Mr. Whiting stated that the city was limited to a tax of half a mill to pay for county suburban roads but in the provincial suburban system there appears to be no limit. Continuing, Mr. Hogarth said that in selecting the mileage against the city of Kingston the department decided upon one mile per million of the city's assessment. Kingston is situated where materials are easily accessible and the cost is comparatively low. The distances formerly covered by the commission are actually less than formerly controlled by the city's own representatives. They extend about five miles from the city. Guelph and Belleville have a fraction of a mile over the assessment, the same as Kingston.

The contention of the province was that in making the change when this particular road was taken over for a highway, the city was really called upon to pay a lower rate than before when it was a county suburban road.

After counsel presented these arguments, the commission decided that the city had no case, and it was dismissed.

BANK AT RIO DE JANEIRO.

The Canadian Bank of Commerce Is to Enter Field.

The Canadian Bank of Commerce is about to open an office in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, and add another important link to the long chain of branches of that institution.

The importance of Rio as the capital and metropolis of the largest country in South America is not fully realized in Canada. Its population exceeds that of Toronto and Montreal combined, being 1,200,000 and it is the seaport for the most densely settled part of the Republic.

Rio possesses a magnificent landlocked harbor, twenty miles long and five to ten miles wide, the entrance of which is open to ships of the greatest draught. Deepwater quays have been constructed which permit mooring and loading direct of the largest vessels. As the seaport for an extensive and rich territory the harbour activity is great and a large percentage of the foreign trade of the country passes through it.

At the present time Brazil, in common with the rest of North and South America, is suffering from a reaction following the war trade. This condition is further aggravated by the fall of the exchange value of her currency abroad. The situation will adjust itself, however, in due course and the wonderful natural resources and the fertility of the country ensure its future prosperity.

Canada's interest in Brazil as a market for her exports is in its infancy—but is steadily becoming stronger and the establishment of a branch of The Canadian Bank of Commerce will help to foster and expand the growth of our trade with the republic.
