FRENCH TRAIN EXPOSITION

Thousands Had a Look at the Products of France That Could be Used Here.

"La France Au Canada Train Exposition" reached the city at 3.20 p.m. on Thursday and drew many hundreds of citizens down to Ontario street opposite the Canadian Locomotive Works, anxious to inspect it. For more than two hours there was a steady stream of visitors through the seven cars containing the examples of articles manufactured in France. The train consisted of thirteen cars under the command of Comte Raoul de Arnaud, delegate of the French government for the "Made-in-France" exhibition train.

Car No. 1 under the charge of M. Kaulez gives a fair idea of French intellectual development, as well as her achievements in the fine arts, including sculpture. Nos. 2 and 3 show French industrial, commercial and touring interests set forth, including civil engineering, public works, metallurgy, mechanics, furniture, ornamentation, land transport, sea transport and air transport; No. 4 contains French fashions, and is under the charge of Mr. Lheureux. Here Paris millinery, gents' furnishings, ladies' shoes and slippers, beautiful Lyons silk, women's and children's wearing linen, ladies' outfitting, men's hats, walking sticks, umbrellas and show-window articles. No. 5 shows the products of leather industries, men's and ladies' fine gloves and footwear, also perfumery, chemical arts, etc. This car is in charge of Mr. A. Lecocq. No. 6 under the charge of Mr. Benard, contains Paris fancy goods, scientific instruments, brushes, games, tobacco boxes, toys, small articles, photographs, agriculture, horticulture, manufactures food stuffs, and mineral waters. No. 7 in charge of Mr. Henriot, contains jewelry, jewel settings, gold and silverware, cutlery, clocks, bronzes and art works.

There are in all cars numerous illustrations that are an education in themselves and the visitor should take time to make a thorough inspection and study of what is to be seen. It is a glimpse of France commercial and one cannot fail to get inspiration and real profit.

The train was open Thursday evening from 7.30 to 9.30 and it was thronged with visitors. Today it was a great attraction. The result of this enterprise is expected to be a great stimulus to the Canadian French trade. It was conceived and put into service by the minister of commerce and industry of France and the people of Canada everywhere have shown great enthusiasm and have welcomed the visiting train in a way that shows their desire to carry on an extensive business with our allies of France no less renowned in the arts of peace than heroic and honorable in war.

Comte Raoul de Arnaud and the delegates of the French government were met by Mayor Nickle, J. M. Campbell, president of the Board of Trade, and many prominent citizens and welcomed to Kingston.

Entertained at Dinner.

The French Mission which accompanies the French exhibition train, and of which Count d'Arnaud is the head, was entertained by the city council and Board of Trade at dinner at the Frontenac Club on Thursday evening. It was a splendid event and one greatly enjoyed by the visitors. Those representing the party were Count Raoul d'Arnaud, Mr. Revele, Lieut. Cheureux, Robert Carby, A. R. Muddiman, of the Canadian Government Department Commission, Earle J. Herbert, representing the Canadian Pacific Railway, and H. R. Charlton, representing the G.T.R. Among the Kingstonsians were Mayor Nickle, J. M. Campbell, Gen. Macdonell, Principal Taylor, Gen. Ross, A. M. Rankin, W. F. Nickle, John Donnelly, P. B. Chown, W. Cooney, F. S. S. Johnson, U.S. Consul, Father Nicholson, Elmer Davis, J. G. Elliott, Alan Stroud, W. R. Givens, R. C. Kent, W. K. Macnee, Dr. Sands, F. Conway, J. P. Hanley, W. H. Craig.

Mayor Nickle presided, and in his address recounted history. The present French mission was not the first one Kingston received. Two hundred and fifty years ago Count Frontenac was here and made a treaty with the Indians on the site that the present French train stood. He referred to the military standing of Kingston and its heroic citizens who served in France. He touched on its commercial and educational standing and cordially welcomed the visitors. The toast to the French Mission was cordially drunk.

Count d'Arnaud, in reply, said Canada stood with Great Britain in the front ranks of civilization. He eulogized the work of the Canadians in the war. Dealing with the object of the French Mission, Count d'Arnaud said one of the main objects was to get acquainted. Almost everything produced in Canada is needed in France, and the same might be said of the French products. The speaker hoped the Canadian government would reciprocate by sending a similar train to France, and that many Kingston citizens would accompany the train. In conclusion the speaker said that the trip through Canada had been a revelation.

J. M. Campbell made a few pertinent remarks and Mr. Muddiman told of the projected visit of a Canadian train to France in an interesting way. He was sure it would be a trade stimulating trip. Gen. Macdonell, Principal Taylor and W. F. Nickle spoke entertainingly and happily of French life and the hospitality of the French people. To know them was to admire them. As an allied people they should be encouraged commercially. They re-

joiced that the tour has been so auspicious.

MEETING TO DECIDE THE FUTURE OF EGYPT

The Basis on Which British-Egyptian Negotiations Were Held.

London, Oct. 28.—The Cairo correspondent of the London Times learns from trustworthy sources that the negotiations between the Egyptian Premier, Adly Yeghen Pasha, and the British government have been conducted on the following basis:

First—In the future British troops to be confined to Port Said and the eastern zone of the Suez Canal.

Second—A British controller of the public debt to be appointed.

Third—Egypt to have the right of diplomatic representation abroad, but in all treaties, save commercial agreements, the British government to have the right to be consulted.

Fourth—Alexandria to be a British naval base, with an international police force.

Fifth—The Anglo-Egyptian Sudan to remain as at present, with the enjoyment of equal rights by both countries and the safety of the Egyptian water supply to be guaranteed. The agreement, if reached, the correspondent adds, will be submitted to the national assembly about the middle of November, when Adly Pasha is expected to return to Egypt.

Bandit Kills Mail Clerk.

San Francisco, Oct. 28.—Frank B. Adams, mail clerk and guard, was shot and killed by a masked bandit who entered the Ferry postoffice and escaped with a sack of registered mail. The value of the loot has not yet been determined.

West Northumberland Liberals were unable to coax Sam Clarke, M. P., to accept the nomination to the federal house, and though three others were nominated, all declined.

Japan stands ready to cut down her navy if the powers reach understanding at the Washington conference, according to vice-admiral Tomosaburo Kato, member of the Japanese delegation for Washington.
