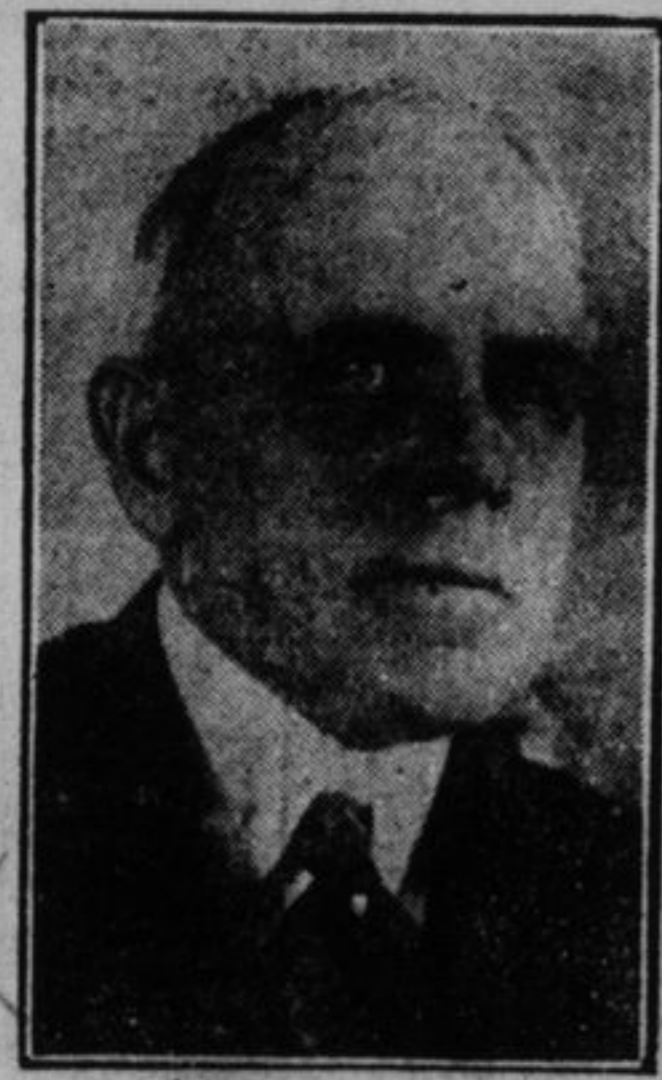

THE POLITICAL ARENA.

Liberal Women Organize. Pembroke, Nov. 2.—The Liberal women of Pembroke are not asleep. A representative gathering of women met in the offices of Dr. M. McKeay, Liberal candidate, Committee for helping in registration and other work in connection with the election were formed.

Won't Give Drayton Seat. Owen Sound, Nov. 2.—It can be definitely stated that North Grey will not be the refuge of Sir Henry Drayton in the coming election. In speaking to a correspondent Mr. R. Duncan, the government candidate, stated definitely that he would not back out for any outsider, and that he would be in the fight until the last vote was polled.

London Tories Name White. London, Ont., Nov. 2.—The Meighen government followers, at a convention held in the Masonic Temple, nominated ex-Ald. J. Frank White of the London Rolling Mills Company to oppose C. R. Somerville, the Liberal candidate and, possibly, a Labor nominee.

Opposes Ballantyne. Montreal, Nov. 2.—Mrs. Rose Henderson has announced herself as Labor candidate in St. Lawrence-St. George division, this city, for the forthcoming Federal elections. The other candidates are Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Government, and H. M. Marler, Liberal.

Bennett to Speak in Ontario. London, Ont., Nov. 2.—It is announced that Hon. R. B. Bennett will speak in Ontario on behalf of Government candidates. His Western Ontario meetings next week will likely be in London, Chatham, and Windsor. Sir Henry Drayton will speak in Watford and Petrolia on Thursday in the interests of J. H. Armstrong, East Lambton.

THE PREMIER MAY RESIGN

If Ulster Blocks His Plan to Secure Peace in Ireland.

London, Nov. 2.—Lloyd George has definitely and regretfully abandoned all hope of attending the inaugural sessions of the Washington Conference, and yesterday he cancelled his passage on the Aquitania.

Lloyd George believes that a settlement of the Irish question may be brought about by a "beau geste" on the part of Ulster. If Ulster will give up Tyrone and Fermanagh, the two northern counties which have a Roman Catholic majority of population, the Sinn Fein will recognize allegiance to the British Crown, and everything will be well with the Irish world.

Equivalent to Coercion. Lord Birkenhead, once dubbed "Gallop Smith," insists that the demands upon Ulster to make a "beau geste" of abandoning Tyrone and Fermanagh are equivalent to the coercion of Ulster, which is one of the things which have been ruled out of order in the question of an Irish settlement.

Lloyd George, in his speech Monday, laid little emphasis on the point of the coercion of Ulster. He dwelt chiefly on the points of Irish allegiance to the British Crown and the security of the British Empire. For Ulstermen hold that to make a bargain with the Sinn Fein in which Tyrone and Fermanagh will be pawns would be to play a losing game, the end of which would be disastrous for loyalist interests.

Alternative of Rejection. Lloyd George, if people in close touch with him read his mind correctly, holds that the Sinn Fein can be won over and made a steadfast friend of Great Britain by a concession of the two Catholic counties of Northeast Ireland. If neither Ulster nor Ulster's backers in Great Britain will make such a concession, and at the same time, the Sinn Fein remains adamant in regard to the recognition of allegiance to the British Crown unless concession is made, what remains? Nothing except to make war upon Sinn Fein Ireland or to abandon Ulster.

Plan of Settlement. London, Nov. 2.—There was reason to believe that the plan of settlement of the Irish question, drafted and discussed in detail by the committee of four delegates representing the government and the Sinn Fein, is now the chief subject being considered by the two delegations.

London, Nov. 2.—After the Prime Minister sat down, on concluding his speech in the Commons Monday, John Jones, Labor M.P., was ordered out of the House by the deputy speaker for making an interruption.

Lloyd George's Son May Contest Pembroke Seat

London, Nov. 2.—Sir Ewan Jones, Coalition Liberal M.P. for Pembroke-shire, has intimated he will not seek re-election after the end of the present parliament. It is understood the county Liberal Association are approaching Dr. Gwilym Lloyd George, son of the premier, with a request that he stand in the Coalition-Liberal interest.

Hon. A. J. Balfour Leaves London For Washington

London, Nov. 2.—Hon. A. J. Balfour will leave Liverpool today on the S.S. Empress of France for the Washington conference by way of Quebec. He is accompanied by the Earl of Cavan, Sir John Jordan and Vice-Air Marshal H'rgine. United States Ambassador Harvey and Japanese Ambassador Hayashi bade the party farewell.

ENDORSES SENDING OF VETS V.C. Heroes To Carry Wreath to Washington Ceremonial.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Premier Meighen, according to Secretary J. F. Marsh, G.A.U.V., has endorsed the sending of Sgt. W. L. Rayfield, V.C., and George Richardson, the nonagenarian V.C. holder, to Washington to represent Canada in the Armistice day ceremonies. They will lay a wreath of maple leaves on the tomb of the American unknown soldier.

Sir Edward Kemp, Senator.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—The Toronto Telegram, in a news item, forecasts the appointment of Sir Edward Kemp to the senate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Frederic Nicholls. In that event the East Toronto constituency, where Sir Edward has already been nominated by the Conservatives, would be re-opened. The name of E. B. Ryckman, K.C., is suggested for the possible vacancy in East Toronto.

Ulster Premier Needed. London, Nov. 2.—It was declared here this morning that negotiations had progressed to the point that the presence in London of the Ulster premier, Sir James Craig, is regarded as necessary. It would appear that the day when Ulster must be associated with the Sinn Fein is near at hand, declares the London Times. But the manner and time of Sir James Craig's coming are among the obscurities of the situation.

New York Milk Strike. New York, Nov. 2.—There is a small prospect in sight for an early settlement of the milk drivers' strike, although little hope for an adjustment was expressed by both sides to the dispute when they entered into conference in Mayor Hylan's office this morning.

A HORRIBLE CHARGE MADE

U. S. Senator Says Soldiers Shot And Hanged Without Trial.

Washington, Nov. 2.—Investigation by a special committee into charges by Senator Watson, Democrat, Georgia, that U. S. soldiers in France were hanged without court-martial or other trial was ordered yesterday by the senate by unanimous vote. The committee will be appointed by the president of senate, and Senator Watson will be invited before it to produce proof.

Senator Watson's charges precipitated a heated debate in the senate. One hundred and seventy returned men have been dismissed from the Toronto post office. The funeral of Lady Laurier takes place on Friday morning at Notre Dame cemetery, Ottawa.

Senator Watson replied that he assumed full responsibility for his charges. He said he would refuse to go before any committee with his evidence, or to produce his witnesses unless they were guaranteed immunity.

"I mean every word I said," he added, "and did not overpaint the picture. I have a photograph of the gallows upon which white soldiers were hanged, and I can produce witnesses who saw it, if it is safe for them to appear."

The Lewiston People Claim Miraculous Cures. Boston, Nov. 2.—Practically the whole city of Lewiston, Maine, swears by three-year-old Charlotte Lariver, the child healer, as she is called. They insist that, she drives away pain and cures wounds by simply touching her fingers to the afflicted spot and listing a short prayer. They say that by the laying on of her hand and murmuring "Saint Anne, cure you," she can cure and has cured toothaches, headaches, rheumatism, colds, coughs, sore throats, and other afflictions, and that in the same way she has healed burns, scalds, bruises, scratches, injuries of every description.

SUDDEN DEATH IN NAPANEE

John M. Wallace Collapses in Post Office and Dies in Few Minutes. Napanee, Nov. 2.—Terribly sudden was the call that came to John M. Wallace yesterday afternoon. Deceased was in the post office about 5 p.m., and collapsed. He was conveyed to his home but died before anything could be done. Deceased was well and favorably known to every person in Napanee and surrounding country, having lived here upwards of fifty years.

NEWS OFF THE WIRES IN CONDENSED FORM

Tidings From Places Far and Near Are Briefly Recounted.

The Prince of Wales opened the Maltese parliament. Atlantic storm takes big toll on Newfoundland coast.

Another singular feature being widely commented on in the west is the activity of James Weir, ex-Farmer M.L.A. of Alberta and ex-vice-president of the U.F.A., now supporting the McRwen government. Weir left Winnipeg tonight for Calgary, where he will take the platform for the government candidate.

While many Farmer conventions have refused to combine with or endorse Labor candidates, Progressives and Labor divided the delegates Saturday for the Springfield constituency of Manitoba. R. L. Richardson's old seat, and placed a fusionist in the field. And yet it is officially stated that the Dominion Labor party will not take part as an organization in Manitoba, though James Simpson, of Toronto, spent some time in Winnipeg and the west organizing this branch of the Labor movement this summer with the avowed purpose of having a candidate in each seat.

Differences of the leaders in this province as to policy are assigned as a reason for this new attitude. In some rural seats the Liberals are officially refusing to name candidates against the Farmer nominees, while in other constituencies there are two Liberal candidates representing the two Manitoba factions of the party.

Bishop Chides Vice for Speech By Doyle

London, Nov. 2.—Because he allowed Sir A. Conan Doyle to occupy the pulpit of Oxford church, Rev. G. Vale Owen, vicar of the church, has been sharply rebuked by the Bishop of Liverpool. Although Conan Doyle did not actually speak on Spiritualism, the Bishop thinks he used words directly bearing on it when he said that he and those of the same faith who desired to restore the spirit life in England regarded Oxford church as the lighthouse to lead them to higher and purer planes.

Haltion Jail Kept Prisoners Safe. Milton, Nov. 2.—The statistics of the Haltion county jail for the year ending September 30th have been completed by Governor McGibbos, and are as follows:—Number of prisoners, 101; married, 17; single, 84; temperate, 41; intemperate, 60; daily average cost of feeding each prisoner, 19.26 cents. There were no female prisoners. Nearly all those sentenced to Portsmouth penitentiary and the Ontario reformatories were non-residents of the county. Not a single one made his escape.

THE EXILES PROCEED TO GALATHE, RUMANIA. Budapest, Nov. 2.—Charles and Zita are on their way to Galathe, Rumania, on a British monitor, and their exile from Hungary will likely be permanent.
