Former Burglar Tells Whig Any Dub Could Clean City Out.

Mingston is an easy place to burgfarize. Why you're wide open, and any dub could clean the city out." This was not the statement of a

police inspector or of a detective, bu. it was the statement of a man about fifty-two years, dressed in shabby clothes, a week's growth of beard. who walked with a slouch wearing his cap pulled down over his eyes. He knew what he was talking about, but declared that he was not one of the burglars. He had served nearly all of the past twenty-five years in penitentiaries and prisons for burgary, robbery, etc. He came to town only two days before and left Tuesday by the noon train for the west on because he was hard up and there was not work obtainable in King-

He had tried his hand at burglary in many places and knew what he was talking about. "Anyone can take a chance in this place from what I have been able to learn during a very short visit. I wasn't in that job last night, though," said he, referring to the robbery of Mahood Bros.' store, "I got out of prison down east last July and have been in the United States since. There is no work there for anyone, for conditions in business there are far worse than in Canada."

The party was referred to the mayor who did the best he could for him, after satisfying himself that he was not involved in the burglary of Mahood Bros.' store.


