**HELPING TO ALLEVIATE**

**That is Work of Home For Friendless Women and Children.**

"You are not encouraging a condition, you are helping to alleviate a condition that exists," said Canon J. W. Jones at the annual meeting of the Home for Friendless Women and Children on Tuesday afternoon, and then went on to say that the Christ-like work of raising the fallen was the work of the true woman and was done in this case in a kindly way that doubled its value.

Mayor Nickle, who was in the chair, spoke along the same lines and said that he considered the infant's home a necessity to the municipality. Mrs. W. H. Maenee, the president, presented an encouraging report. During the year twenty-eight children were admitted and cared for, five more than last year. Six have been adopted into good homes, seven died, one having reached the age limit, was transferred to the orphan's home, six children were claimed by their parents. At the present time there are four women and eighteen children in the home. It was hoped to have the building wired for electricity this year as with so many little ones, it is felt gas, enfeebling the lighting of matches, is unsafe, but the tenders called for \$150 and this is more than can be spent. A hot water coil has been placed in the furnace to supply extra hot water. Mrs. E. J. B. Pense kindly paid for this great comfort.

It is difficult to finance the home with the present high cost of living, but the hard work of the committee has made it possible to carry on. The report mentioned the good work done by the matron, Mrs. Thompson, and her assistant, Mrs. Caswell, who with the women in the home, do all the work required. Owing to the careful attention of Dr. Day, the health of the children has been good, an outbreak of mumps being the only general illness during the year. The tag day in May brought in \$860. The committee is grateful to the city and county council for their grants and generous Christmas donations. Thanks are due to Miss Van Straubensee for giving a series of song and reading weekly.

Mrs. E. J. B. Pense, the secretary, read the minutes of the last annual meeting. Mrs. George McGowan gave the treasurer's report. Total receipts \$3,560.26; total expenditure \$3,333.31, balance \$176.95. Owing to some outstanding bills there is a deficit of about \$250.

The officers were re-elected and are as follows: Hon. president, Brigadier-General A. E. Rose; president, Mrs. W. H. Maenee; ice presidents, Mrs. D. G. Laidlaw and Mrs. Herbert Robinson; treasurer, Mrs. G. McGowan;

corresponding secretary, Mrs. Garnet Lockett; recording secretary, Mrs. E. J. B. Pense.

The visitors were allowed to govern the home to see the tiny white beds and cradles, and to play with the dear little inmates, who are so ready to greet the strangers. One sees they are only used to gentle words. Some of them are the children of soldiers in the military hospitals whose wives have gone to work and the three little Rose children, who were in an indescribable state of neglect when brought to the home, are now clean, healthy and happy. Mrs. E. J. B. Pense made tea in the reception room and the visitors enjoyed a cup with delicious home-made cake and sandwiches.

**Stocking Lemon Extract.**  
Titchborne, Oct. 31.—(To the Editor): Your headline, "Rapped on the Knuckles", on page 16 of today's issue of your paper, and which referred to the remarks of Magistrate Farrell with reference to the sale of lemon extract for use as an intoxicant; it would appear as if the sale of this article is more extensive than generally supposed and I can hardly think that it is confined to legitimate merchants. This is based on the following incident. On Friday last a young man boarded the C.P.R. train leaving Kingston around noon. The conductor states he was apparently O.K. when leaving Kingston, but before reaching this point he was entirely under the influence of lemon extract, of which he had consumed three bottles as shown by the empty bottles found in the seat he occupied. He was removed from the train here in an insensible condition and was dead to the world until 6.30 p.m. when the agent was able to get him wakened up enough to put him on the eastbound train for Montreal for which point he held a ticket. On going through his pockets five more bottles of extract were found, and in his kit bag a number more were found and destroyed by the agent. An example should certainly be made of parties who will sell this amount of flavoring to a young man whom anyone could see had no intention of using it for its legitimate purpose.

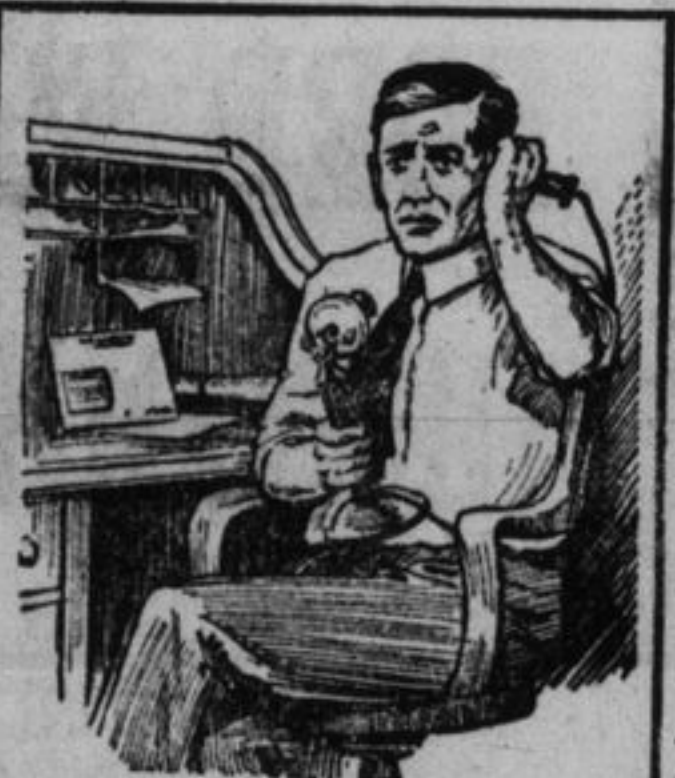
If an Honor Roll is going to be prepared, it should include every Collegiate Institute student or graduate who went overseas. If mistakes have been made, then they should be corrected.
