Turtle With a History. While cleaning out the attic in a house on Rideau street, occupied at

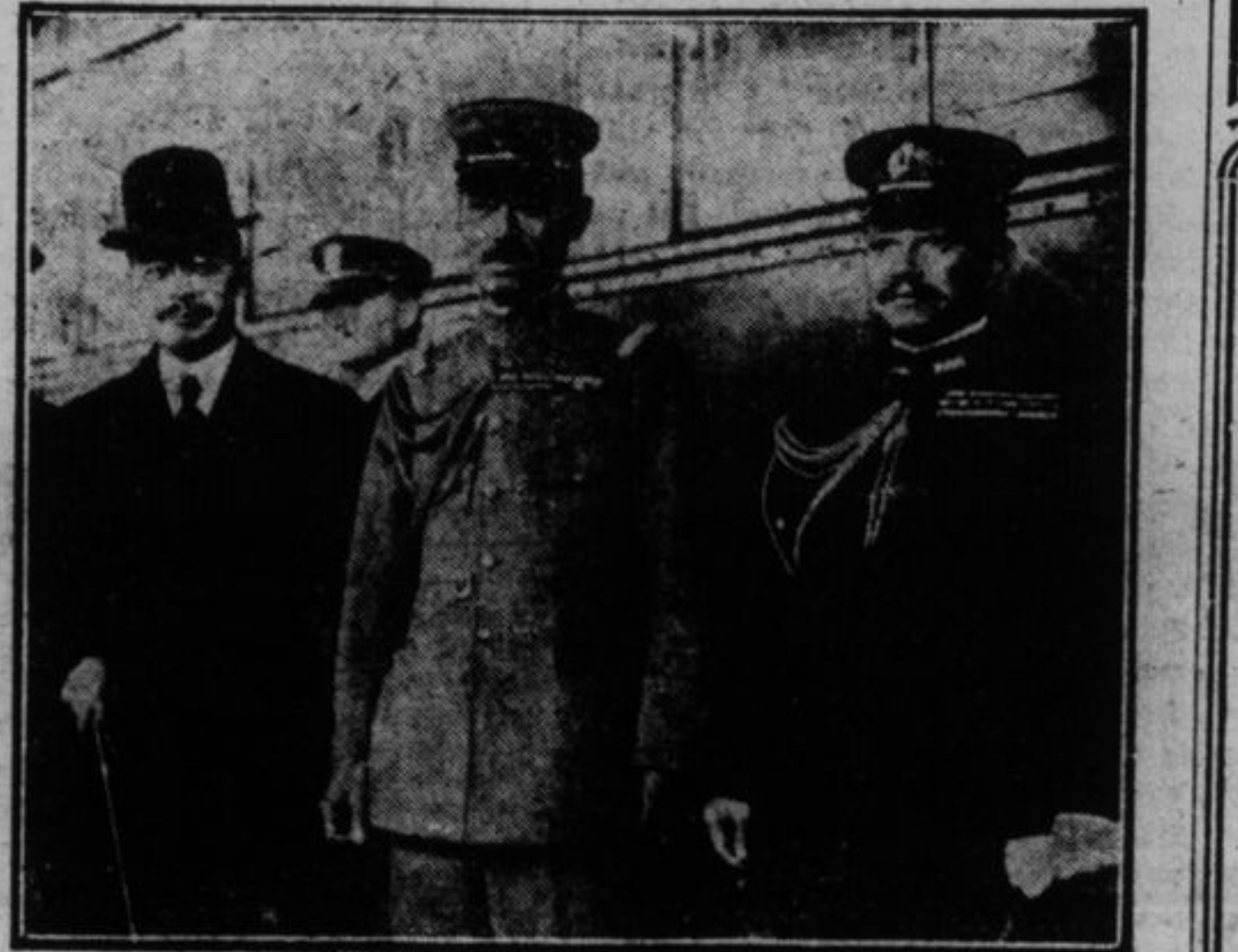
