**Cousin of Sir Archibald.**

Brig-General Archibald Hayes Macdonell who has been appointed to the senate is a cousin of Major-General Sir A. C. Macdonell, commandant of the R. M. C., and has been for some time general officer commanding military district No. 7, St. John, N.B.

**Hurrying the Work On.**

Cyril Knight, Ontario government geologist, is still engaged in the work of making a re-survey of the Cobalt silver area. This work was commenced early in the summer of 1920, and was suspended for the winter months 1920-21, to be resumed again last spring. It has been learned that the department is desirous of completing the work this year.

**Becomes Caretaker.**

Capt. Lewis J. Estes, of Alexandria Bay, N.Y., who has been for the past five years captain of W. H. Post's steam yacht, and for thirteen years caretaker of Seow Island, his summer home, has resigned his position to accept a like one with Guy Carleton Lee, of Carlisle, Pa., who recently purchased the summer home of the late Senator Hawkins among the islands.

**A Change from Last Year.**

Many large shipments of apples have been sent this year from Graton, Colborne, Brighton and Prince Edward county to western cities of the United States in response to the heavy demand from those sections and the high prices prevailing. The total sales up to date are around

**\$150,000, in striking contrast with the shipment of last year, which totalled only \$5,000.**

Mr. Cooper's purpose is to have an operation performed, owing to injuries he received when fighting for the freedom of the world from German oppression, tyranny and bondage.

After the canvass of the congregation of Christ Church, Belleville, the sum of \$750 (with considerable more to hear from), was handed in at a social evening held in the Parish Hall on Thursday. This campaign took the place of the annual bazaar and the result is gratifying, especially when it is considered that only a few weeks ago the congregation gave a Thanksgiving offering of over \$430.

**A Lifelong Resident Dead.**

The funeral took place at Eganville on Tuesday of a lifelong resident of Eganville, James Boland, who passed away in his seventy-sixth year. Interment was made in Melville Presbyterian church cemetery, large numbers of the late Mr. Boland's friends and relatives attending. Besides his wife, the late Mr. Boland left three daughters, Mrs. Nolan, New York; Mrs. J. Plann; Renfrew, and Miss Cecil Boland, Toronto.

**Social at Woodburn.**

An enjoyable Sunday school social gathering was held in the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bell, Woodburn, on Monday evening. There were sixty-five present and Mr. Cramer presided. The evening's entertainment consisted of games and music. A splendid supper was served at 11:30 p.m., and Rev. A. S. Doggett, the pastor, in a very appropriate address on behalf of the young folks, thanked the good host and hostess for the pleasure of the evening.

**Wedded At Centreville.**

The marriage was solemnized on Monday, Oct. 24th of Mrs. Margaret MacCaul, Camden East, to William Caigh, Picton. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father McCarthy, St. Anthony's church, Centreville. The bride was becomingly attired in a costume of navy tricotee with navy over-wrap and hat of navy velvet. The attendants were Mr. and Mrs. James C. Doyle, Camden East. Immediately after the ceremony Mr. and Mrs. Caigh motored to Picton, where they will reside.

**A Successful Year.**

The Smith's Falls public hospital board has had its annual meeting. Total cost of operating last year was \$32,733, of which wages and salaries absorbed \$6,776. On capital account \$915 was expended. Mr. McKimm stated that on the year's operations the hospital was one thousand dollars to the good. There is no debt and an endowment of \$28,000. The whole hospital property was worth \$120,000 or more. It is owned by the people, is a valuable asset, and is doing a great work in the community.

**Endorses Missionary Work.**

Edward Ty Chian, B.Sc., sent to Canada by the Chinese government to make a study of Canadian railway methods with a view to applying them to the Peking-Mukden railway, has completed a five months' stay in Smith's Falls, and from there went to Montreal. After a further investigation of a few months there he will go to Toronto. His stay in Canada is to last two years. He is a Chinese citizen whose command of English is good, and he was in demand by local church societies for addresses upon the work of missionaries in India, which work has his cordial endorsement.

**Sale of Fine Old Home.**

William H. Postlewait has sold his big stone residence at the head of St. Lawrence street, Merrickville, along with about twenty-five acres of land, to Harry McLean, Montreal, who is interested in the stone quarry at Deitz. Mr. McLean got's what is the largest dwelling in Merrickville. It is a well built stone house erected about twenty-five years ago by the late Aaron Merrick. The new owner will get possession about April 1st, and meanwhile Mr. Postlewait will fix up for his own occupation the old Dr. Merrick home. **Buy 300 Acres of Pine.**

Three hundred acres of the finest of pine remaining from the forest primeval has been purchased in Lanark county by W. A. Nichols, who owns a sawmill at Carleton Place. The timber is near Hopetown, about midway between the Kingston and Pembroke railway and the Mississippi river, and logs will be hauled to the river and floated to Carleton Place. There will be enough logs, it is said, to keep the Nichols mill running for several seasons. A number of men have been sent to the woods to commence the felling of trees. This splendid grove was one of a number saved in Lanark county from the early lumbermen by men with whom sentiment outweighed the utilitarian.

**Married At Merrickville.**

A stir was created in Merrickville social circles on Wednesday by the marriage of Norman Harold Lang and Miss Edna May James, one of the most popular couples ever forming a life alliance there. There were no attendants, but official witnesses were Miss Sadie Hughes and A. L. Lang. The bride wore a travelling suit of navy-blue serge, a black hat with ostrich trimmings and the groom's gift of sable furs. They received many nice gifts, among them a string of pearls from the Methodist choir whose organist the bride has been for some time past.
