ALL CANADA OBSERVES ARMISTICE ANNIVERSARY

Flags Flew at Full Mast—Memory of the Dead Reverenced.

Toronto, Nov. 11.—All Canada to-day joined in thanksgiving and reverence in celebration and observance of Armistice day. Flags flew at the tops of poles at the glory of the victory which the day commemorated but red poppies and two-minute cessation from work at the eleventh hour brought back to Canadian minds and hearts, the memory of the sacrifice of sixty thousand sons whose bones lie mingling with the soil of Flanders, topped with the bluebells of France and significant forget-me-nots.

London Multitudes Sang
London, Nov. 11.—On the stroke of the hour marking the third anniversary of the armistice of the great war, London to-day paused for a mute two minute testimony to the nation's grateful remembrance of victory and reverent tribute to the fallen. A few minutes before eleven o'clock all vehicular traffic was diverted from Whitehall, Piccadilly Circus, the Stock Exchange Place, Trafalgar Square and other public spaces. Into these spaces great crowds gathered and as the hour approached the throng joined in singing, "O God Our Help in Ages Past."

ULSTER CABINET MAKES COUNTER PROPOSALS

After Rejecting British Government Plan for Settlement of Irish Question.

London, Nov. 11.—The Ulster cabinet today rejected the government's plan for the settlement of the Irish question on the ground that it contained fundamental principles, which under the existing conditions were impossible of attainment. It is, however, putting forward counter proposals. A communique issued by the northern Ireland cabinet suggests that the government should consider these counter-proposals before the proposed meeting of the British and Ulster cabinets.

Ulster's objection to the plan is believed to be that it would deprive her of representation in the imperial parliament which she regards as her strongest safeguard, and also that it would give Sinn Fein a majority on the proposed central council for Ireland. Another objection was that the Sinn Fein majority would so adjust the taxation as to favor the agricultural south to the detriment of the manufacturing north.

Takes Further Action Against Export Houses

Windsor, Nov. 11.—Further action on the part of Attorney-General W. E. Roney to oust the liquor-exporting warehouses from the Windsor border front was seen by a prosecution in Windsor police court today against the Essex Exporters, Ltd., of Petite Cote, charging them under section 41 of the Ontario Temperance Act with keeping liquor in an unlawful place.

A New Plant for Brockville.
Negotiations for the location of another new factory at Brockville were completed with the signing of agreements between the J. R. Baxter Co., Limited, Montreal, and J. Amos Johnston, industrial commissioner of Brockville, for the immediate erection of a grinding wheel factory, 200 feet by 50 feet, to be built west of the Machinery & Foundries Limited, at an approximate cost of \$24,000. The consideration of a site and the fixing of the assessment of the new plant at \$10,000 for a period of ten years.
