MINSTREL SHOW AT MOWAT

Was Given on Wednesday Evening by S. Salisbury's Dixie Company.

When Sid Salisbury undertakes to entertain the soldier patients at Mowat hospital, they always look forward to something special, and are never disappointed. On Wednesday evening, however, something out of the ordinary was provided, nothing less than a real old-fashioned minstrel show. Many of the patients from the Sydenham hospital were present and the large recreation room was well filled.

An orchestra, composed of Miss Grace Newlands Harold Salisbury and R. Whitney, played popular music, while the burnt cork was being applied to fair complexions in the dressing rooms. An opening chorus by the troupe was followed by a song from Stan Mayer entitled, "Who dat say chicken." Jack Elder rendered "While moonlight down in Dixie" in a pleasing manner, and W. J. Salisbury sang "Alexander Jones." The other songs were: "Don't you remember the time" by Jim Saunders; "The whang, whang blues" by Sid Salisbury; "Give me dat watermelon," by Charlie Reynolds; and "Kentucky Blues" by Stewart Salisbury. All the choruses were catchy and the jokes up-to-date. The monologue given by Charlie Reynolds was very funny, and the dialogue between Reynolds and Mayer was also good. Jack Elder with his Scotch songs was as good as ever, while T. Kelly, elocutionist, was also a treat. A number from the harmony quartette, and an instrumental trio, completed one of the best entertainments which has ever been provided at the hospital.

The Dixie Minstrels as the troupe is known, made a big hit with the boys, and Dr. McKay expressed the appreciation of the staff and patients to Mr. Salisbury, and George Young, of the military "Y," who made the arrangements. Coffee and cake was served to the entertainers by the entertainment committee of the hospital.

BUILDING IN CANADA.

Expansion in the Volume of Building Is Contemplated.

The total value of building permits in fifty-six Canadian cities during September last was \$9,988,147, as compared with \$9,654,095 in August and with \$9,174,181 in September of last year. Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia registered gains over the preceding month, while New Brunswick, Manitoba and Saskatchewan reported decreases. As compared with September of last year, all provinces except New Brunswick and Manitoba reported expansion in the volume of building contemplated.

The forthcoming issue of the Labor Gazette, from which this information is gleaned, states that Montreal, of the larger cities, registered increases during September as compared with August, 1921, and with September of 1920, while Toronto and Winnipeg showed contractions in both cases. In Vancouver the value of building permits issued during September exceeded that issued in August, but was slightly under the total for September of last year. Of the smaller centers, Shawinigan Falls, Westmount, Chatham, Hamilton, Ottawa, St. Catharines, Windsor, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton and South Vancouver recorded pronounced gains in both comparisons.

Use of Newspaper Space Best for Declining Business

"Go back and advertise," was the advice which James H. Ross, of the M. T. Garvin Company, Lancaster, Pa., gave to a fellow merchant who complained of the condition of business, and said he was reducing his staff and had eliminated his advertising in order to save expenses.

"There is nothing so good for a business that is dying as newspaper space," said Mr. Ross, in an address at the convention of the Pennsylvania Retail Dry Goods Association.

"I told my friend to stop retrenching, to spend more money. Go right back and take a page ad, and go after business," he said. "I met him a few days later and he told me that he had thought over my suggestion and had instructed his son to draw up a full page ad."—Fourth Estate.
