Of the 117 children under the guardianship of the society, 98 are Protestants and 19 Roman Catholics. There are 53 boys and 64 girls. Seven of the wards have been treated for ailments at the Kingston General Hospital. One boy, aged eleven years, was found mentally diseased, and was transferred to an Orillia institution.
