

A FINE CONCERT GIVEN AT OPENING OF BAZAAR

Most Little Drama and Musical Numbers Before Capacity Audience at Convent.

The assembly hall at Notre Dame convent was filled to the doors Monday evening for the concert put on by the pupils to mark the opening of the big bazaar being held at the institution all this week.

The concert was half musical and half dramatic, opening with a chorus "O Canada," by the junior pupils of the St. Vincent's Academy.

The main part of the programme was taken up by a four-act drama, "Through Darkness to Light," beautifully played by girls of the school.

Three complete changes of scenery took place in the drama, all with the speed and efficiency of a modern playhouse.

At the conclusion of the concert, Rev. Father R. Coyle, on behalf of the sisters of Notre Dame, thanked those in attendance for their presence and cordially invited them to the bazaar, which, in the absence of Mayor Nickle, he formally declared open.

In the older part of the convent, on Bagot street, many rooms had been fitted up with great care and these now present a pretty sight.

Booths of all kinds, gay in bunting and flowers, appear to view on every side, and each booth is loaded down with wares.

Others have home-made work for sale; flowers are on sale in still others, and, of course, there are very many loaded with good things to eat, without which a bazaar would be no bazaar at all for the youngsters.

CARING FOR THE CHILDREN

Kingston Children's Aid Society Doing Splendid Work—Annual Meeting Monday.

That the Children's Aid Society is carrying on work that calls for special commendation, was manifested at the annual meeting of the society held in the city buildings on Monday afternoon.

Dr. Sands made a timely suggestion to the members, that of endeavoring to secure more members for the society, and the suggestion will be acted upon.

All the old officers were re-elected as follows: President, Dr. A. W. Richardson; secretary, Dr. W. W. Sands; treasurer, O. V. Bartels; auditor, A. H. Muir; Inspector, John Pollie.

Executive for the city: Dr. G. W. Bell, William Murray, Reeve James Halliday, J. W. Bradshaw and the mayor.

The work of the inspector, John Pollie, was very highly commended by all the members. Mr. Pollie is doing good work, and is regarded by all engaged in the work of the society as being "the right man in the right place."

Mr. Pollie gave a most interesting account of the work during the year. He pointed out that notwithstanding the fact that there was a great deal of unemployment, and a good deal of juvenile crime, only one city child under sixteen years of age, had been committed to the industrial school during the year, and not one county child had been committed.

In the industrial schools of the province there are at the present time only two boys from this city or county, committed since 1918. Two city and eight county children were committed to the guardianship of the society during the year, all being placed in desirable foster homes.

Of the 117 children under the guardianship of the society, 38 are Protestants and 19 Roman Catholics. There are 53 boys and 64 girls. Seven of the wards have been treated for ailments at the Kingston General Hospital. One boy, aged eleven years, was found mentally diseased, and was transferred to an Orillia institution.

Not one of the seventeen children committed to the society's care since August 1st, 1918 know the meaning of the word "shelter," as applied to the children's aid work.

Miss Harris, who for a number of years was faithful and assiduous in the work of the office, was married last June, and for a time the society was greatly handicapped, as her experience and personal knowledge of the work was valuable to the society.

Miss Mary Barnes was appointed to fill the vacancy, and is rendering efficient and satisfactory service.
