Invitation Extended to Lake Racing Association for August.

The Lake Yacht Racing Association will be invited to hold its annual regatta next year at Chaumont, N.Y. The Crescent Yacht Club at its meeting in Watertown, N.Y., decided to extend such an invitation to the association and Edward S. Lansing, who commanded the George Cup challenger, Huskie II, at Hamilton this year, was selected as a delegate to attend the annual meeting of the L.Y.R.A. at Toronto, Dec. 3rd, and personally invite that organization to come to Chaumont as the guest of the Crescent Yacht Club next August, when the regatta will be held.

ENTERS HIS 80th YEAR

J. B. Walkem, K.C., Strong, Physically and Mentally.

The flag on the collegiate institute is flying to-day in honor of Chancellor J. B. Walkem, K.C., a former chairman of the Board of Education. There are some people who dislike to have their age known, but Mr. Walkem is not one of them, and today he admits that he has entered his eightieth year. He is so strong physically and mentally that he could pass for one of sixty-five. Mr. Walkem was born in England in 1842 and came to this country with the family several years later. Kingston became his residence on the first of January, 1869. He studied law here with his brother, the late Dr. R. T. Walkem, and has been in active practice ever since. As a citizen he has occupied many prominent positions with credit to himself and to the benefit of the public. A society with which he is still connected is the Victorian Order of Nurses, not only locally but as a member of the national executive. He is a man of many parts, a good scholar, speaking German and French; the latter as fluently as English. He is a good billiard player and golfer, and as a musician he composed one of the most pleasing pieces played by the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery band at public dedication services.
