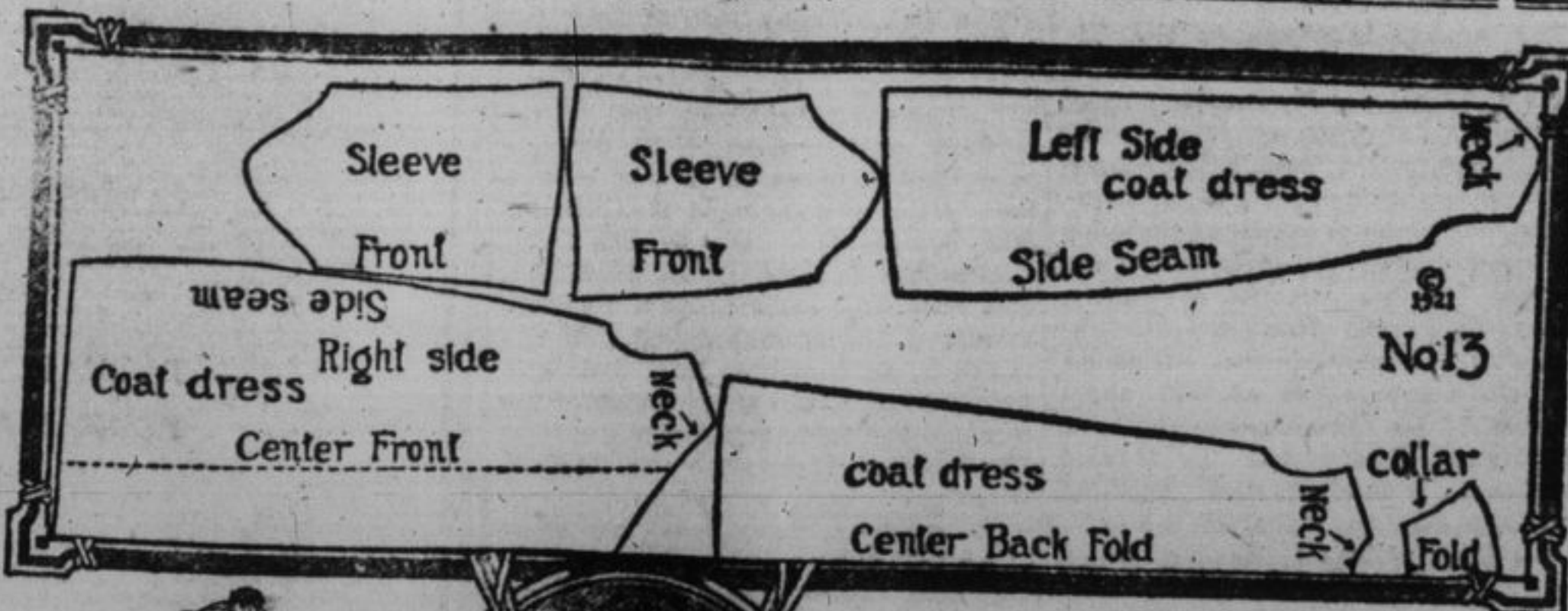

A Coat Dress of Duvetyn Trimmed in Fur or Fabric and Inexpensive

Any Girl Can Make this Winter Coat Designed by Marion Davies.

This is a coat dress of duvetyn with Astrakhan trimming or finished off with the new fur fabric. It is effective in blue, brown or black of any shades according to personal tastes.

The back of the dress is cut on the lengthwise fold of the material, the right side of the fold on a single layer of material and the left side also on the single. The dotted line indicates the center front. The revers, is formed by folding back the material from the collar or neck line to the waistline.

The collar is cut on a single layer of material and joined to the neck by matching the notches. Two and one-half to three yards of material, 56 inches wide, are required and of the fur or fabric one and one-half to two yards.

BRITISH WOMEN FOR CANADA

Miss St. John Wileman, who has been engaged for many years in trying to improve the conditions for women emigrants to the dominions, convened a successful conference at the Women's Institute, London, last week to discuss the establishment of overseas settlements for women on the group system and the manner in which they should be trained for the various industries proposed to be carried on in them.

The settlements, it is proposed, should be located on the outlying parts of the big towns and the industries would, so far as possible play into each other's hands. All the lighter forms of farming, such as poultry keeping, pig breeding, bee-keeping, fruit raising, dairying etc. would be included in the programme. Also weaving, for which there is a great field open owing to the unlimited supplies of flax. Glove making and fur making and finishing would be two very suitable trades, and the canning of fruit would be a profitable source of revenue.

It is proposed that women who are desirous of going out to Canada to earn their living in one of these ways should train themselves in this country at one of the centres where arrangements would be made for their reception of a course. At Kensington-on-Thames, for instance, there is a flourishing weaving institution. A breeder of pigs in the country has expressed himself as quite willing to receive pupils and testifies to his belief that women make the best pig breeders. Other industries would provide opportunities for training on similar lines. It is not proposed that the scheme at first should apply to women without any means, as it would probably be necessary for them to pay for part of their training and to have a certain sum for support during the first year of their residence in Canada. is hoped, however, to induce the British and Canadian governments to contribute towards the cost of the women's passages when improved conditions enable the Dominion government to remove the present restrictions on immigration. Dr. Folmer, the Canadian minister of agriculture, is much interested in the scheme which, it is understood, has his hearty approval. The conference was attended by representatives of Women's Societies, clubs, schools and training institutions; and business experts connected with the various industries concerned in the scheme gave information on their respective work. A unanimous resolution was passed urging the necessity for taking further prompt measures to expedite arrangements for selecting, training and settling women in small groups overseas, so that they can support themselves in remunerative industries.

Miss Wileman informed the Dominion News Service that Lady Haig and Lady Robertson are both taking a keen interest in the scheme.

Japanese women are giving up smoking, due to the uplift work being carried on in that country. Formerly all classes of women in Japan smoked in public as well as in their homes.

Queen Marie of Roumania is a keen business woman and has taken upon her shoulders the responsibility of rebuilding the industry in her country. Six days' rioting in Belgas cost eighteen lives.
