PANIC SEIZES MEIGHEN MEN

Premier Extends Stay in Western Ontario Owing to Appeals For Help.

Strathroy, Dec. 5.—A deluge of appeals from ridings throughout western Ontario for a personal visit from Premier Meighen indicates the extent to which panic is spreading in the government camp. In response to an urgent S. O. S. from Windsor, Mr. Meighen Saturday consented to visit that city on Monday night where he will fire the last shot in his locker. Meetings at Wallaceburg and Chatham on Monday afternoon and evening respectively, have already been added to his itinerary which was previously to have ended at Petrolia Saturday.

It has been a strenuous campaign for Mr. Meighen, who has been on the stump continuously for ten weeks and it was only with extreme reluctance, after the urgency of the situation in North Essex had been impressed on him, that he consented to extend his tour to Windsor.

Mr. Meighen brought needed reinforcements with him when he led a forlorn hope into the riding of West Middlesex. The reinforcements consisted of Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, and "that man O'Connor," West Middlesex Conservative, who is a son of the late Sir George Ross, former premier of Ontario, who has held the constituency since 1911 and is a popular figure throughout the riding. J. D. Drummond, Progressive candidate, is also putting up a strong campaign and George Elliott, the Conservative standard bearer, is expected to finish a poor third.

The panic extends also to East Middlesex and to the city of London. In East Middlesex another D. G. Ross is running on the Liberal ticket against S. F. Glass, Conservative member in the last house and A. L. Hodgins, Progressive. In London Mr. C. F. Sommerville, Liberal, appears to have the lead over W. F. White, Conservative, and A. Mould, Progressive.

Mr. Meighen addressed two crowded meetings here Saturday afternoon and then pushed off to Petrolia to aid the faltering cause of J. E. Armstrong, who is falling far behind in the race with B. Fancher, Progressive.

TWO BANDITS SHOOT CHARLES DONOGHUE

Rushed to the Door.

The fact that Mr. Donoghue called for help, and that his sister hurried to the door, is believed to have frightened the bandits off.

A representative of the Whig visited the Donoghue home shortly after the shooting. Miss Donoghue said she heard some person calling, and rushed to the back door to see what was the matter. The bandits had gone, and her brother staggered into the house, stating that he had been shot and hit on the head. Investigation showed that he had not been robbed of his money.

Brock Street Incident.

Between 9 and 10 o'clock, on Saturday night, a report was received by the police, to the effect that two men, acting in a very suspicious manner had been noticed running into the passageway alongside Cooke's church, on Brock street. It was stated that the men afterwards ran out of the passageway, which leads to the Sunday school, and were about to accost a woman coming up the street, but when they noticed two other men coming along they ran up Brock street.

It was also reported to the Whig that several nights ago, two men were in a laneway about opposite Mr. Donoghue's home, and that they held up a couple of women who had been out in an auto. On this occasion, the women said they had no money and ordered the men away, and they left without causing any trouble.

The City is Stirred.

Not in years has the city been so stirred as over the present epidemic of burglaries, hold-ups and shootings, and it is the general belief that all the jobs have been put over by the same men.

The killing of Night Constable Richard Beard, at Napanee, the latter part of August, was the first serious case, then followed the shooting of Constable James Cotter, of Kingston, on Sept. 16th. In addition to these two shootings, scores of people have been held up and robbed, stores have been robbed, and houses ransacked. However, Kingston has not been alone in this work as there has been a country-wide sweep of crime.

The provincial police department at Toronto was notified about the shooting on Saturday night, and sent a couple of the detectives here on Sunday to work on the case.

QUEEN'S A.M.S. ELECTIONS

H. R. Myers Chosen President—Little Interest Taken By the Students.

Queen's Alma Mater Society elections, which were held Saturday, resulted in the election of the following executive for the ensuing year: Honorary president, Dr. J. C. Connell (acclamation); president, H. R. Myers, (science); 1st vice-president, J. T. M. Wilson, (arts); 2nd vice-president, E. A. Clark, (medicine); critic, A. Abernethy, (medicine); secretary, A. G. Hamilton, (science); treasurer, V. Minnes, (science); assistant secretary, Miss Georgina Ettinger and athletic stick, C. E. Ratchford, (arts). The committee, which were elected by acclamation, is as follows: Miss McKercher, G. H. Brown, (science), J. T. Gow, (arts) and C. Matheson, (medicine).

The elections this year were accompanied by little of the enthusiasm which characterized the elections of former years. In only a few instances was there any campaigning. The presidency was closely contested, the president elect, Mr. Myers, having but seventy-five of a majority over Ken Keill, the medical candidate.

The announcement of results did not bring the usual large crowd out and the students was not as enthusiastic as usual. The successful candidates in short speeches thanked the students who had worked for them and the defeated candidates were also called on for speeches.

The new system of elections given a trial on Saturday have in the opinion of the majority of the students not been as successful as the old system when there was more faculty competition.

In the early part of the evening before the announcement of election results Dr. A. E. Ross addressed a small gathering of the students in Grant hall. J. H. Pilkey, vice-president of the A.M.S., introduced the speaker and intimated that J. M. Campbell, the Liberal candidate for Kingston who had also been invited to address the student body but was unable to be present. Dr. Ross who is rector of the University stated, on rising, that the evening reminded him of the time he had been elected president of the A.M.S. He dealt with some of the points in the platform which he represented in the federal election and stated, that as Mr. Campbell was not present he would not take advantage by discussing any of the local issues. He stated that a feature of the local campaign had been the work of the women and remarked that the speeches of Miss W. Gordon had surpassed many of the speeches made by the men during the campaign. Before concluding, Dr. Ross mentioned the units which had represented Queen's overseas and told the students that they were known as among the best, by officers in authority.

The question of initiation was again thrashed out at the meeting of the A.M.S. Saturday evening. Many of the students are in favor of the old style of rush but as it is understood that this form does not meet with the approval of the senate, an endeavor will be made to come to an agreement with that body on the form to be adopted. The present scheme is impracticable was shown this year when the arts initiation developed into what was really one of the old time rushes. Some of the students propose a secret form of initiation but this does not find favor with the majority. The students appointed a committee to confer with the boards of the university on the question.

The science students intend holding their annual at home on the evening of Feb. 8th and their dinner the following evening. By holding these two events on consecutive evenings opportunity is given for the graduates to attend both events.

Queen's choral society will not be re-organized this year as the students have not shown sufficient interest to encourage the executive.

The appointment of professors Jolliffe and Matheson and Mr. C. S. Johnson to the athletic board of control have been made.

A group of students at the university who call themselves the "Boisheviks" have issued a "manifesto" to the effect that now as the athletic junk of the college is dead they are going to work for the return of the old customs which were considered to have been one of the means of keeping the Queen's spirit alive. Some of these are the parade, the rush, the old form of election, and the presentation of the dramatic clubs performance at the Grand. They state that under the present conditions the university is fast changing from the status of a seminary to that of a cemetery.

Joyville Entertainment. The ochre and dance under the auspices of the Ladies' Altar Society, of St. Barnaby's church held at Joseph Murphy's, Joyville, on Tuesday evening was a decided success. After all competitors had been eliminated it was found that Mrs. Gravelle and Joseph Martin were the fortunate winners. At the conclusion of the games a dance was enjoyed. The excellent music was furnished by Mrs. H. McGrath and V. Malles, Kingston. Dainty refreshments were served by the ladies of the society.

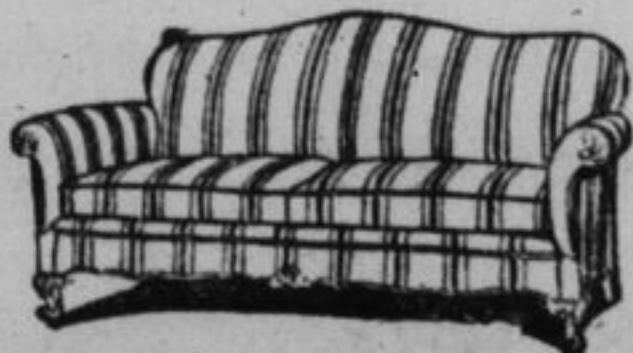
