**STEAMER WAUBIC AT WINTER WHARF**  
Cape Vincent-Kingston Ferry Ends Busy Season—To Undergo Improvements.

The steamer Waubic, running between Kingston and Cape Vincent, N.Y., completed a most successful season. This season's patronage exceeded that of any previous years for a number of seasons past and the Rockport Navigation Company, owners of the ships, are well pleased with the results of their purchasing the new craft.

After finding that the steamer Misquol, which ran the ferry for a few years, proved inadequate, as far as space and service were concerned, the Rockport Navigation Company of Kingston purchased the Waubic and last May put the boat on this run.

According to official figures 14,275 passengers entered the United States from Kingston and probably a greater number have left for Canada through the Cape. It is safe to say that during the season the Waubic has carried about 30,000 to and from Cape Vincent. There was an increase of 4,223 over the season of 1920, of incoming passengers.

Approximately speaking, about 3,800 automobiles have been carried by the ship and a large amount of freight. Large shipments of fish to the Booth Fisheries Company have been transported by the Waubic.

For a large number of years Capt. Robert C. Carnegie of Kingston has been engaged in operating the ferry between here and Kingston. He has complete charge of the Waubic and has proven himself a most capable river captain.

The owners of the ship are looking forward to even a more successful season next year than the present season.

**QUEEN'S WIN DEBATE HERE**  
Defeat Varsity in Platform Contest in Convocation Hall Monday Evening.

Queen's won the intercollegiate debate from Varsity in convocation hall Monday evening before a fair-sized audience. The question of the tariff was the subject of debate, the formal wording being "Resolved that a substantial reduction in the Canadian tariff should be brought about by the incoming Dominion parliament."

The subject was being debated at the several colleges in the union and two other Queen's men were debating at McGill. Queen's debaters were R. E. Wagar and H. Friedgut and they ably supported the affirmative of the subject of debate, winning the unanimous decision of the judges. The negative was taken by C. R. Halliday and J. E. Endicott, who also displayed excellent debating ability.

All four speakers showed that they understood the subject of the tariff thoroughly and were able to present their points in fine style. They were also quick at rebuttal and displayed a keen sense of humor, in the refuting of the arguments of their opponents.

The judges' decision was received with much approval by the audience, who responded to the announcement of the result by J. H. Pilkey, vice-president of the alma mater society, who acted as chairman, with the Queen's yell, followed by a Varsity yell.

This year the judges individually wrote their decision on a slip of paper and had no opportunity to discuss the debate among themselves as in former years. The judges, who were Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson, Prof. W. R. P. Bridger, R.M.C., and E. O. Sitter, K.C.L., briefly spoke at the close of the debate, congratulating the speakers on the fine debate. Dr. Wilson remarked on the sportsmanship which had prevailed during the debate and also remarked on the conviction with which the men had spoken when discussing their side of the question. He also noted that not only was an academic question but one that affected the whole community being a vital question at the present time. Mr. Sitter also briefly spoke. The judges were thanked by Mr. Halliday, Toronto.

The win for Queen's here puts them in a fair chance for group honors for if the team composed of F. A. Knox and W. H. Drummond win at McGill, Queen's will have won the western group composed of Varsity, McGill and the local university. In the eastern group, the winner of which will be met by the winner of the western, are Ottawa college, Loyola college (Montreal) and Bishop's college (Lennoxville).
