According to official figures 14,-275 passengers entered the United tates from Kingston and probably a greater number have left for Canada through the Cape. It is safe to say that during the season the Waubic has carried about 30,000 to and from Cape Vincent. There was an increase of 4,923 over the season of 1920, of incoming passengers

800 automobiles have been carried by the ship and a large amount of the Booth Fisheries Company have been transported by the Waubic.

For a large number of years Capt. Robert C. Carnegie of Kingston has een engaged in operating the ferry between here and Kingston. He has complete charge of the Waubic and has proven himself a most capable

The owners of the ship are looking forward to even a more successful season next year than the present season.
