An Open Letter To Gen. Ross.

Kingston, Dec. 7.—(To the Editor) Allow me to congratulate you on your election as member of parliament for Kingston. Had you had on your side the ammunition in the way of facts and proofs that discredited the government defeated yesterday, your majority would have been one of the largest in Canada.

The six thousand electors who voted for you did so in the belief that the Meighen government would be returned to power, and that as member for Kingston you would be able to work in the interest of this city. I am also convinced that your acceptance of the nomination had this in view, and that those who worked and spoke in your behalf had the interest of Canada in general and Kingston in particular in mind.

Do you not, therefore, believe that it is in the interest of your native city, with the deep waterways scheme practically accepted by the government of the United States and Canada, and which is the only hope of development of this city from which we can expect stimulus and growth, for you to resign the seat to which you have just been elected and allow an acclamation to Mr. J. M. Campbell, who, as you are well aware, has made a study of this subject for some years and is today one of the best posted men in America on the deep waterways and hydro development? As Mr. Mackenzie King said when in this city, Mr. Campbell is and would be more than an ordinary member, and with a Liberal government now assured will most likely be appointed to a cabinet position.

I have known you since your graduation from Queen's always to have been a worker in the service of the city, as alderman and mayor, in the legislature in the service of the province and city, and in South Africa and France in the service of your king and country, always doing the greatest good for the greatest number.

Your resignation as superintendent of the hospital, has, I understand, been provisionally accepted. The work of the extension and enlargement of the general hospital, in order to conform to the requirements of the medical college, is one which you have well in hand and the hospital, city and university would sustain a loss of your services.

Your seat in the Ontario legislature is now open and I have not the slightest doubt that an acclamation would be most cheerfully accorded you and supported by the Liberal paper and the Liberal party. Myself and thousands who supported Mr. Campbell today would most gladly work for and support you, if an election were forced, which is unthinkable. In the Federal House there are no grants to hospitals or universities, while in the legislature you would be able to most fully serve the interests of the general hospital and your alma mater.

Knowing that you have always had the interests of this city at heart, I would ask you if you do not believe that Campbell at Ottawa with an almost certainty of cabinet rank, and yourself at Toronto and also administering the affairs at the general hospital, would not be to the benefit of Kingston. I believe if you were to consult your constituents that the reply of every one of them would be in the affirmative.
