TO EXPEND \$12,000 ON POLICE SIGNAL SYSTEM INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

The City Council to Submit By-Law at January Elections.

The city council met Friday night and decided to put to the people at the municipal elections in January a by-law to raise the sum of \$12,000 for the installation of an electric police signal system which will make the local police service more effective and give protection to a large section of the city. The increase of crime here led the police commissioners, after consulting with leading citizens, to recommend to the council the installation of a signal system which will enable the police constables to be kept continually on their beats and spend less time at the police station. Montreal, Westmount, Outremont and Verdun, Que., have the signal system, and one is being installed at Windsor, Ont. The signal system is operated in this way: There is an electric board at the police station and telephone boxes, electric flash lights and bells at certain corners. When a call comes into the station for police assistance, a button pressed will flash the signal lights or ring the bells along the beats. The police constables will see the lights or hear the bells and get into connection with the station by hurrying to the telephones. In Westmount only last week the police signal system resulted in the capture of two burglars within twenty minutes as they were headed off before they could get very far away from the scene of their work.

The police commissioners recommended to the council that a by-law for \$8,000 be submitted to the electors for a signal system consisting of ten boxes and ten lights, but Aids. Graham, Litton, Rodger and O'Connor were of opinion that unless a large section of the city was given protection by the system, the ratepayers of the outlying sections would not support the by-law. All the people were entitled to protection, the outer portions of the city as well as the business parts. Therefore, Aid. O'Connor moved that a by-law be submitted for the expenditure of an amount not exceeding \$12,000 so that a larger area than suggested originally be included in the police beat system.

There was some discussion on the merits of the system, but the aldermen were all agreed that something had to be done to render the police patrol more effective. The signal system would result in bringing the police station closer to the outlying sections of the city as the station would be always in touch with the constables on their beats. The expenditure of \$12,000 will install probably about twenty boxes, twenty lights and twenty bells, and cover a large area of the city. It was felt that this was a by-law that would appeal to the people, for the crime wave has created terror.

A representative of the Northern Electric Company, Montreal, was present to explain the signal system to the council. The work of installation will be done by the local Utilities staff if the people pass the by-law.

A CHEQUE ARTIST.

Origin of Horse-Power.
