# MEMORIAL HALL OPENING ON WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

## The Pressing of An Electric Button on the Platform Will Drop the Union Jacks Covering the Memorial Tablets on the Wall.

The unveiling of the memorial ed by the Germans. It was in this engagement that Jack Cornwall, the wireless operator stayed on the job although mortally wounded. "Sanctuary Wood," 1916, is the one furnished by Mayor H. C. Nickle. The window represents the women and their children who were so dependent on the Patriotic fun of which Mayor Nickle had charge of the Kingston branch.

"Lens", August, 1917, the gift of S. F. Kirkpatrick. During the war the prosperous city of Lens was lowered to a mass of broken stone and bricks by the great shell fire. "Vimy", April, 1917. It was at Vimy where the present Governor General Sir Julian Byng, who was then in command of the Canadian Corps, captured thousands of German prisoners and accomplished a deed which other corps of British army had failed to do. Isaac Cohen donated this window.

"Paschendale", 1917, the gift of the Steacy family, Canadians who were at Paschendale will never forget the mud. At that point many horses sank in mud and were never seen again. "Cambrai", 1918, where the Canadians accomplished wonderful gains have crossing the Can Du Nord which the German high command believed could not be done. This window is the gift of William Harty, Jr., whose brother, the late "Jock" Harty, died in England.

"Scapa Flow", Nov. 23rd, 1918. This is the gift of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company. "Mons" window which commemorates the cessation of hostilities on November 11th, 1918, is the gift of W. F. Nickle, K.C. Canadians who were at the taking of Mons will never forget the hospitality shown by the citizens of Mons.

The hall, which has been recently re-decorated at considerable expense, is one of the finest in the dominion. The twelve memorial windows, which are the gifts of Kingstons, are the best that money can buy. Electric lights have been so arranged on the outside of the windows, so that in the evenings the figures in the windows are as clear as in daylight. The lighting of the memorial hall is of the indirect system, that is, no lights are visible to the naked eye, being very restful. The tinting of the walls is certainly a credit to the decorators who did the work. The hall is seated with the most up-to-date folding chairs which can be purchased. The chairs have been painted so as to correspond with the inside decorations of the building. The platform is furnished with furniture made by returned men at the Kingston factory of the Art Furniture factory.

### The Tablets.

On the tablets are the names of two hundred and fifty-eight Kingstons who gave their lives in the cause of freedom. Among this list are two young women, namely, Agnes Pomeroy, and Daisy Fortescue. The tablet to the left as you enter the main door is erected in memory of Kingstons who served during the Great War. The following inscription appears on this tablet: "In honor of Kingston's sailors, soldiers, airmen and nursing sisters who served in the Great War, 1914-1918."

Two bronze tablets are to be erected on the right and left of the platform. One deals with the early history of the building and the other with the Memorial Hall. Four bronze coats-of-arms have also been erected. They are, the city coat-of-arms, Dominion coat-of-arms, British coat-of-arms, and the family crest of the late Sir John A. Macdonald, premier of Canada.

It is quite likely that the cadets of the Royal Military college will form the guard of honor for the governor-general. A tablet is also to be placed in the hall in memory of John Macdonald Mowat, ex-mayor of Kingston, who fell while fighting with the infantry in France. After the ceremony at the city hall the governor-general will be entertained at the home of W. F. Nickle, K.C., and in the evening he will receive the honorary degree at Queen's university.

The following is a description of the windows and the names of the donors: "Ypres," the gift of Henry E. and the late Robert Richardson. It was at Ypres that Canadians suffered gas for the first time on April, 1915. "St. Eloi", April, 1916, was donated by Wm. Hugh Coverdale, son of William Miles Coverdale, who was city engineer of Kingston, 1877 to 1884.

"Amiens", August, 1918, which was given by the late George Y. Chown, represents a member of the Canadian Cavalry which for the first time came into action at Amiens when the Canadians penetrated the German lines for a distance of fifteen miles. The Canadian casualties were great but it was considered the greatest attack during the war.

"Somme", 1916, was the gift of the Canadian Locomotive Company. It was at the Somme in 1916 that the British tanks were used for the first time. The Germans who had never seen such instruments of warfare were greatly alarmed when they saw the large monsters moving.

"Jutland", May 31st, 1916, was donated by Hiram A. Calvin, represents one of the greatest naval battles in the history of the world. It was on that occasion that Admiral Beatty struck an although outnumbered.

Net earnings . . . \$1,036,130.34 "Nothing succeeds like success," said Mr. D. B. Hanna, president of Canadian National Railways. "That first little net of \$47,000 for August put new life into the organization, and what's more, it helped with a big section of the public. We find that there is all over Canada a better feeling towards the National System. The fine service given by the C.N.R. in handling the grain this fall has also had something to do with it."

Is Good Advertising "The net of half a million dollars, announced for September," continued Mr. Hanna "is helping us now; and the net of \$1,036,130.34 in October means more business for us in December and succeeding months. It's the best advertising we can get. Many business men too busy to follow the ins and outs of the railway question, could not understand the deficit—they did not like the idea that money they paid us for freight would go into a deficit. Now when they see we are out of "red" figures they are giving us more of their business. We need long haul traffic, and if we can get enough of it we will pull out even in December—unless the weather is very bad—notwithstanding the forthcoming reduction in rates. January and February are the bad months to face, but we are not at all despondent about the future and if the lower rates prove any help to business, the railways will certainly be pleased to handle it. Greater volume of business is what the National Railways want for Christmas and our socks are hanging up all along the line from the Atlantic to the Pacific" concluded Mr. Hanna.

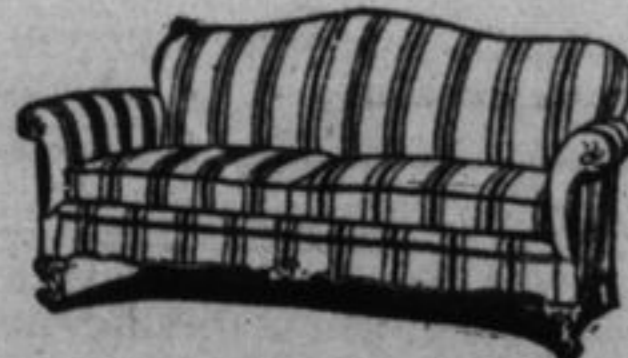
