When Sir John Was Defeated.
Toronto Globe: Mr. Meighen, if he accepts the offer of a seat from Burrard, B.C., will have the precedent of Sir John A. Macdonald for going west. Sir John was defeated at Kingston in the general election of 1878, but immediately afterward was elected by acclamation in Marquette, Man., which he vacated on acceptance of office as premier and minister of the interior on October 17th.

1878. He was then elected for Victoria, B.C., which he represented until the general election of 1882.

Stay in McLaren Estate.
Acting for the executors of the estate of Senator Peter McLaren, the late Perth millionaire, J. B. Clarke, K.C., moved before Justice Middleton at Osgoode Hall for an order staying proceedings under an order by Justice Masten, which directed administration of the estate under the supervision of the court. It was arranged that proceedings should be stayed, pending the appeal, the assets not to be dealt with, and no moneys withdrawn without the consent of the court, the appeal being expedited.

Prof. J. F. Macdonald, trustee for Victoria ward, is hesitating about returning to the Board of Education for another term, in view of the pressure of work put upon him. He has been on the board for eight years, has impressed himself as a real educationist, a fine business administrator and a decidedly congenial person. For these and other reasons his colleagues feel he should not retire when his experience and good judgment is so much needed. Busy men are the men who do things. Victoria electors will assuredly return him by acclamation.

Eye Will Be Saved.
Another hunting accident occurred in the vicinity recently, when George Porter, Elginburg, was shot on Monday afternoon by Arthur Smith of Kepler, while the two, with a party of men, were hunting in Johnston's woods, near the former village. Several pieces of shot were embedded in the unfortunate man's face, and the left eye was also seriously injured. Mr. Smith, whose car was handy, drove Porter to the General Hospital, where his wounds were treated. On inquiry it was reported that he had a very quiet night's sleep, and is progressing favorably. According to the doctor in attendance, the man's eyesight will be saved. It is not known just how the accident happened, but it is thought that in the excitement of hunting, the gun was discharged, when Smith tripped over some obstacle in his path.
