

The "Snappy" And The Sluggish Engine

Good Or Bad Ignition Or Carburation Often Differentiates Them ERE ARE SOME OF THE USUAL factors that give an engine the prompt pick-up and high available output, which place it in the former class and those which, on the other hand, by making it logy and low powered relegate it to the latter category. Carbura tion: Quick acceleration is obtainable only when the mixture used is slightly richer than the theoretical and therefore the must economical proportioning, unless some special device is used to give a momentary excess of fuel at the instant of opening the throttle-a feature embodied in several recent carburetor designs. Maximum output also requires a mixture at least as rich as called for by theory. Very slow acceleration and low maximum power always characterize an engine which is running on a decidedly lean mixture and to an even greater degree one which is receiving an excessively rich mixture, which burns in complete ly, loads the intake passages and interferes with ignition. Unless mixture quality lies within rather a narrow range, inferior results are inevitable. To secure lively results, the gasoline must be well atomized and enough heat must be supplied to prevent loading of the intake passages and the unequal distribution of masses of liquid fuel to the several cylinders. Engines which run too cold, or have their carburation systems underheated are bound to accelerate jerkily and reluctantly, although they may be capable of fair maximum power. Ignition Timing: The promptest pick-up and best maximum power is secured when the spark is advanced in correct proportion with increases in engine speed from a correct initial setting and, in practice, the automatic spark control comes nearer achieving this result, than does manual control, as handled by the average operator. But with the automatic advance, now so generally employed the manual regulation provided is very slight and practically speaking, the operator always runs with the spark lever in a fixed position, so that an incorrect setting of the ignition-cam may give permanently retarded ignition, with its attendant results of poor acceleration and output. An over-advanced setting will advertise itself by the knocking which it causes, but the unduly retarded setting may continue in use for a long time without detection and take the "pep" out of an inherently lively engine. It is widely believed that a very hot, energetic spark makes for snappy operation and where a lean mixture is employed, at least, this view is undoubtedly credible. There is no question that spark-plugs with inferior core-insulation or electrical leakage elsewhere in the system, contributes to sluggish and irregular acceleration.
