PAPER-ROPE BASKETRY



Unroll the crepe paper. With your scissors cut it lengthwise, across grain, into long strips about two and a half inches wide.

Fasten one end of a strip in the door jamb, as the girl in the illustration has done. In the other end of the strip make a small loop and run your pencil through it. Stretch the strip out. Turn the pencil from right to left till the strip is well twisted.

Twist another strip in the same manner. Then place both strips in the door jamb, run your pencil through the loops, and twist the paper together, making the paper rope. Instead of turning the pencil from right to left, however, turn it from left to right.

When the outside of the sides has been covered, begin on the inside of the box. But first, if you do not wish to cover the bottom of the inside with crepe paper, glue a piece of cretonne matching the color of the box, neatly to the outside of the box with glue, an inch or so up the sides. Then glue in the paper-rope.

Cover the lid with rope. The illustration shows how this is done. Begin gluing the paper-rope at the edge of the lid and work toward the center. When the rope has become firm in its place give it two coats of shellac. The dresser set is made in the same manner. Smaller boxes, however, must be used for foundations. Two-pound candy boxes will do nicely.

The "Snappy" And The Sluggish Engine

Good Or Bad Ignition Or Carburation Often Differentiates Them. HERE ARE SOME OF THE USUAL factors that give an engine the prompt pick-up and high available output, which place it in the former class and those which, on the other hand, by making it logy and low powered relegate it to the latter category.

Ignition Timing: The spark is advanced in correct proportion with increase in engine speed from a correct initial setting and, in practice, the automatic spark control comes nearer achieving this result, than does manual control, as so generally employed the manual regulation provided is very slight and practically speaking, the operator always runs with the spark lever in a fixed position, so that an incorrect setting of the ignition can give a permanently retarded ignition, with its attendant results of over-temperature and knock.

Common Salt Abatement: F. A. G. asks: Will ordinary salt, added to the water prevent a radiator from freezing? Some friends of mine are trying it.

Answers: In make-and-break devices, in which a cam forces the points apart, the break comes slightly earlier in proportion as the gap between the points is increased and the spark advance thus tends to increase, but unless the gap is excessively wide, ignition does not take place until the points are normal, to produce noticeable results. The use of an extremely wide gap decreases the period during which the contacts are together and the circuit closed, and the result of this may be that, at very high speeds, the coil does not have time to fully charge, so that weak or uncertain sparks may be produced.
