### Letters to the Editor

#### Macgillivray's Nonsense.

Cataragui, Dec. 10.—(To the Editor.) Your issue of the 9th inst. contained a letter signed by one J. C. Macgillivray, on which I ask space to make a few comments. It is quite in order for those who win in an election to freely express their pleasure and for the losers to accept defeat with as good grace as possible. There is an old saying which, to the credit of decent Canadian citizenship, is pretty generally observed that "The victors can afford to be generous to the vanquished." There are, however, a few, a very few, so small-souled and narrow as to go out of their way to offer gratuitous insult to those who have suffered defeat. Such manifestations do not indicate a high order of intelligence and rarely occur in those who have had the exceptional educational advantages with which Mr. Macgillivray has been favored. In fact he is the first university professor's son I have ever known to descend to that level. He says, "The electors of Frontenac showed good sense in not re-electing Ex-Hon. Dr. J. W. Edwards."

First allow me to say that the introduction of the "Ex" in the sentence quoted above shows either unexpected ignorance in one of supposed erudition or a deliberate desire to be discourteous in one supposed to be a gentleman. As to the electors showing "good sense" in not re-electing me, I may be excused for saying without disrespect to my opponent that I believe there are many in both city and county who hold a different opinion. Be that as it may, the electors have made their choice and time and a comparison of records will determine their wisdom. I don't think the people of Frontenac will be influenced in their conclusions by the judgment of Mr. Macgillivray. Mr. Macgillivray also says, "The doctor will doubtless find the life of a county practitioner less interesting than a \$14,000 job in the Meighen cabinet." No occupation could be more interesting than the practice of medicine. However, since I was first elected in 1908, I have devoted all my time to Frontenac and sacrificed everything to my conception of my duty as a representative of the people and am therefore sadly out of touch with medical work.

The fact that I must begin at the bottom if I decide to practice again should bring to me a word of encouragement rather than a sneer, especially from one of supposed culture who has yet to learn how to provide his own food and raiment. The outlook along the line of medical practice is not alluring, but I would be tempted to face the difficulties and hang out my shingle in Kingston for the chance of treating Mr. Macgillivray for the severe attack of political indigestion which has spotted both his temper and his manners.

Mr. Macgillivray says that harbor improvements and general prosperity would have resulted at once if Mr. Campbell had been elected but Kingston will get nothing now because the member-elect sits on the left of the speaker. On that basis of reasoning and without a foreknowledge of election results, every person should support the government candidates. You will note, Mr. Editor, the declaration of this cultured young gentleman and his indictment of the government he supports. He says the King government has so little regard for justice and fair play as to punish Kingston for not electing a Liberal by withholding necessary public works. That is the cause of his weeping and wailing and gnashing of teeth. Notice, also, with what profound wisdom he presents his mystifying logic. Forsooth the electors of Kingston did not show "good sense" in electing a member to sit in opposition, but the electors of Frontenac showed "good sense" in electing a member to sit in opposition. Oh! wise young man. Oh! youthful evangel of up-to-date Liberalism. What a tremendous shock the Liberal party will sustain if ever you rest from your labors in its behalf. What a blow to Kingston and Canada if you should ever decide to transfer your marvellous knowledge of statescraft and your up-to-date political methods to some other country!
