The steamer Wolfe Islander made the trip from Amberst Island on Monday and had a heavy cargo of freight and a large number of passengers. Sir Henry Decorated.
Sir Henry Drayton has been presented with the Czecho-Slovak War Cross as a recognition of the Sibirian Legionary Corps during its tranquilizing after the front. The presentation of the War Cross has been made by Dr. B. Ryznar, Montreal, Czecho-Slovak Consul in Canada, on behalf of the Republic. It is the only decoration which the Republic has.

A Gift For a Priest.
Prior to the departure of Rev. Father Creamer from Trenton to Smith's Falls, the Knights of Columbus made a presentation. O. E. Fortune read the address, to which the Rev. gentleman made a feeling reply, and a pleasant evening was spent.

The Gratitude of Mons.
A copy of the translation of a cable recently sent by the burgomaster of Mons, Belgium, to the chief of the general staff, Ottawa, has been received by Brig.-General W. B. King, C.M.G., D.S.O., as a token of gratitude for the gallantry and services rendered by the Canadians in the capture of this village. The cable reads as follows: "Thanks to the officers and soldiers of the gallant Canadian army. We remember with gratitude that we owe our liberation to them. (Signed.) Burgomaster Lascaris."

New General Hospital Building.
The addition to the Empire Wing at the Kingston General Hospital, for which tenders have been called to be in on January 4th, will contain thirty-one rooms. The building will be absolutely fireproof. There will be running water in all the rooms and they will be fitted out like those of the most up-to-date hospitals in the continent. The addition will be built out towards O'Kill street. On the end of the new building will be erected a beautiful sun parlor.

It is the intention to award the contract for the building as soon as possible, for the purpose of trying to relieve the labor situation in Kingston during the winter months. Next spring, it is hoped that the plans for the isolation hospital will have been completed, and tenders will be called. The new laundry building will likely be built next summer.

All the officers were present, each one doing her part with great zeal and energy. Mrs. Fergus O'Connor, diocesan organizer, has established the league in the various parishes.
