### RUGBY AMENDMENTS.

Intercollegiate Union To Ask for Four Yards' Interference.

Only two important changes in the rugby rules for 1922 were agreed upon at the meeting of the rules commission of the Canadian Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union held Saturday at the McGill Union, Montreal.

When the Canadian Rugby Union meets sometime this month the intercollegiate representatives have been instructed to advocate the adoption of a four-yard interference rule on the line of scrimmage, instead of the three-yard regulation which prevailed this season. The second important change to be advocated by the intercollegiate will be in the arrangement of the duties of officials at the meeting having agreed that three officials instead of two be used.

The referee will have the same duties as previously, according to the intercollegiate plan, but the umpire will now be known as the assistant referee and his duties will be similar to those of the chief official, although the former will work behind the defending team while the referee will be free to govern the game from any point of the field. The head linesman will be given greater powers, if the proposed changes go into effect at the C.R.F.U. meeting, for he will be empowered to stop the game at any time for infringements of the offside or interference rules on the line of scrimmage. The duties of touch judges have been given to the head linesman and assistant referee and the position of touch line judge dispensed with.

While there were several minor changes advocated to clear up nazy points in last season's rules, the most important revision to the rules suggested was that increasing the interference area on the line of scrimmage from three to four yards. This rule was advocated by the McGill representatives at a meeting of the intercollegiate rules commission in 1919, and was changed during last season. During the past season it was apparent that the three-yard rule prevented offensive play to a great extent and the chief argument brought forward by those supporting the adoption of the four-yard regulation was that it would increase offensive play and eliminate the strong defensive advantage that the old code gave. University of Toronto opposed and it was only after considerable argument from both sides that the matter was finally settled.

That Goalkeeper "Joe" Sullivan will have to play for the University of Toronto this season was the decision made at a special meeting of the U. of T. athletic directorate. Sullivan applied for permission to play with an outside team, if being his intention to join the Granite seniors, but the directorate's decision is final and Sullivan will be second-string net guardian to Langtry, captain of the dominion champions.

As a junior Sullivan ranked as the best goalie in the O. H. A. series, and there are some who believe that he is as good as Roach, the ex-Granite star. He is very keen to play in senior company, and it is likely that his wish will be gratified, as it is planned to use him in some of the intercollegiate and O. H. A. games.

### Syracuse Franchise Will Not Be Transferred

Ernest C. Landgraf, part-owner of the Syracuse baseball franchise, will have his team at Syracuse this coming season, instead of at Montreal, as has been reported for several days.

At a meeting of President Dyer, of the Chamber of Commerce; Secretary Norton, of the same body; E. C. Stearns, representing the park bondholders; Samuel Bredon, of St. Louis, Landgraf's partner in the ownership of the club, and Landgraf, everything was so arranged that the club owners agreed to lease the park for a term of three years at terms satisfactory to the park officials and to Landgraf and Bredon.

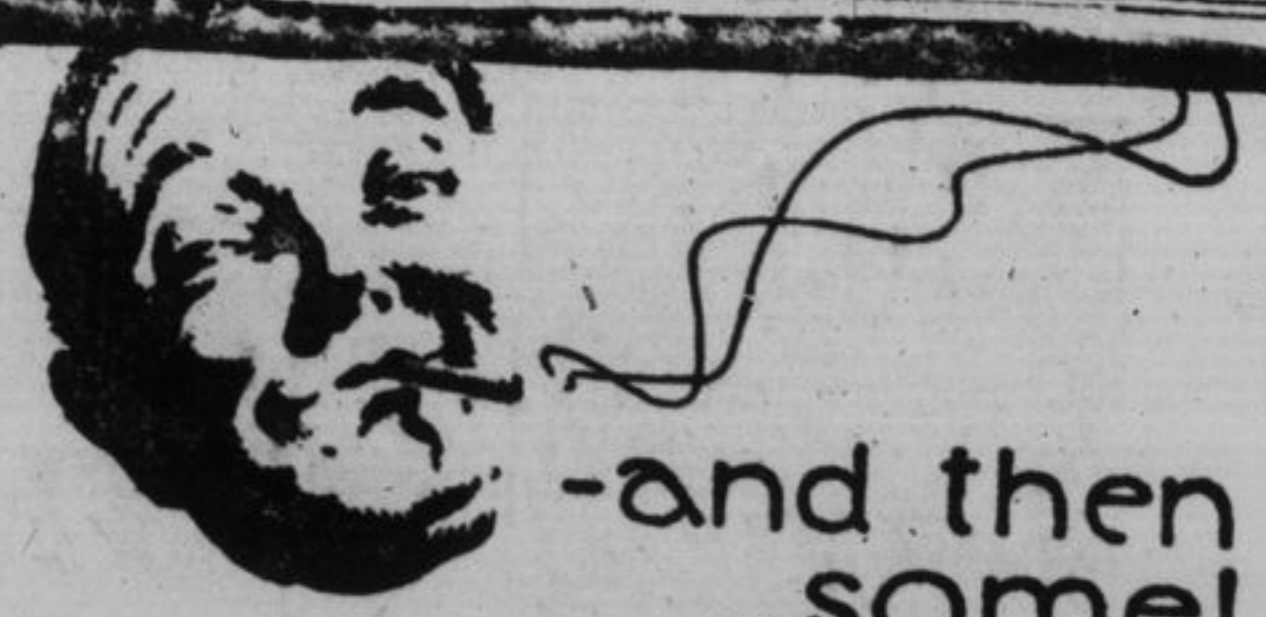
For some weeks Landgraf and Stearns were unable to come to an agreement for the season of 1922, but at the session in the Chamber of Commerce room Thursday they buried their hatchets and for the next three years Landgraf and Bredon will have full charge of the grounds. By the terms of the agreement Landgraf and Bredon are to pay a certain amount for the use of the grounds and are also to spend a certain amount each season in improvements, so at the end of three seasons the park should be fully completed. The failure of the park owners to complete the park is what caused Landgraf to threaten to take his franchise to Montreal.

Landis to Toronto. In the course of his speech at the annual banquet of the National Association Commissioner Landis stated that he intended to visit every league in the association during the season of 1922. He was immediately invited by Messrs. Solman and McCaffery to be the guest of the Toronto Club during the race next summer.

"I shall be delighted to come to Toronto," said Judge Landis. "Tours is the first direct invitation I have received. I quite realize that the United States national game has earned a warm spot in the hearts of the Canadian people, and at least three leagues in the National Association have Canadian members. It is my intention to visit Hamilton of the M.-O. League while in Ontario, and I also hope to stop in some of the other towns of the Michigan-Ontario circuit."

To Enjoy Skiing. Skiing, a popular winter time sport all over Canada, and the north-west states is to be introduced into New York. Taking the initiative in the movement, more than fifty devotees of the sport made up of Norwegian, Swedish and Swiss residents of New York will meet in New York to form a club and to select from a number of prospective sites a ski running course. Plans of the committee of organization include the bringing to New York of champion jumpers and runners from Canada and abroad and the establishment of a U.S. championship cup.

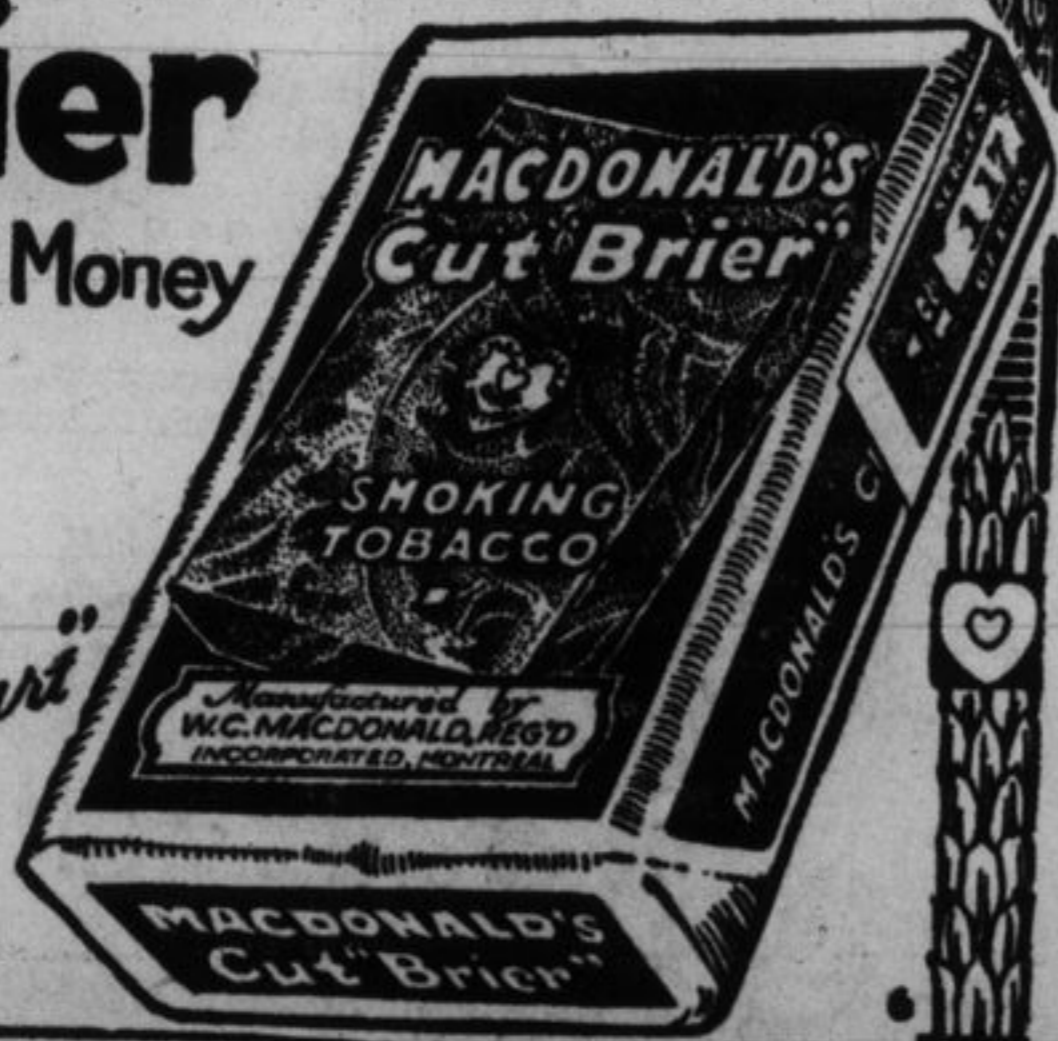
