Price of Turkeys
The price of turkeys is not likely to go below forty-five cents a pound this winter as a very large part of the surplus available for export is already bought up at that price and is being rapidly shipped to New York City for the Christmas trade. On Thursday, several tons of turkeys were brought to the city by motor trucks and disposed of to a local shipper at forty-five cents. The same man has been active on Howe Island, Wolfe Island and Amherst Island. Some of these turkeys weighed as heavy as thirty-five pounds.

Death of Mrs. E. A. Hunt.
Near Duval, Sask., recently the death took place of a former well known resident of Leeds and Grenville counties in Rebecca Bates, widow of E. A. Hunt. Deceased was in her eighty-second year and succumbed to the infirmities of old age. Born at Greenbush, the late Mrs. Hunt was the daughter of William Bates. In her earlier life she lived at Easton's Corners and after her marriage moved to the Northwest. Her husband died sixteen years ago, and she is survived by four children: L. E. Hunt, Grenfell, Sask., Mrs. W. R. Bradley, Hanley, Sask., Newton Hunt, Duval, Sask., and Jason Hunt, Ridondo Beach, Cal.

Indian Looses Suit.
The second appellate court dismissed the appeal of Thos. Green, an Indian, of Deseronto, against the judgment of his Honor Judge G. E. Desroche, County Judge of Hastings county.

Back in the year 1878 the appellant was one of the original male members of a band of Indians who surrendered a large tract of land to the government for certain payments of money each year. The land was sold in 1898 to E. W. Rathbun, but Green continued to reside on his portion during all the years till it virtually became his again by right of possession. It is in the town of Deseronto and he continued to pay taxes on it till 1914, when he ceased to pay them. The result was that the property was sold for taxes to Harry Hall, who subsequently obtained judgment from the county judge for right of possession.

Army Canteen Funds.
Considerable interest is being taken in the local veteran organizations regarding the voting as to the disposal of the army canteen funds, which is now being conducted and will continue until the 1st of February. All ex-service men and women are entitled to a say in this matter, and the majority of those in

this city have already cast their ballots. Among the members of the G. W.V.A., the most popular method of disposal seems to be either the establishment of memorial workshops to give employment for disabled veterans, or using the funds to provide scholarships or other educational facilities to children of veterans, who require this assistance. There are also many, who have put forward ideas of their own, having that choice on their ballot, among these being a plan to grant loans to all ex-soldiers, wishing to spend the time to learn some trade or attend technical schools.

New Card Table Covers.
Embroidered black satin card table covers have a distinct usefulness. Sometimes they are just bound with gold braid, with stout gold cord ties them under the table corners. Sometimes they are embroidered at the corners, with colored silk embroidery. Sometimes they have no tie cords, but the four corners are weighed down with heavy balls of gold that hold them securely in place. These covers are sometimes made of satin hemmed or bound with gold braid, and a good quality of satin is as good as satin. Then there is a little cross-stitch embroidery in rose and a blue yellow and green on each corner. All decorations, of course, must come at the corners so that it will not interfere with the players cards.

ASPIRES TO SENATE.
Arthur C. Hardy's Name Mentioned for Vacancy.
Brookville, Dec. 16.—In political circles here the name of Arthur C. Hardy, president of the Ontario Liberal executive, is being prominently mentioned in connection with the vacancy in the senate caused by the death of Hon. T. W. Crothers. The son of a former premier of Ontario, and the son-in-law of the late Hon. George T. Palford, Mr. Hardy has been an active supporter of the Liberal party for years, and in 1917 was the unsuccessful candidate in Leeds riding against Sir Thomas White.

To Increase Supply.
Montreal, Dec. 15.—The water supply of Montreal has been increased 25,000,000 gallons a day by the action of the water board in cutting a hole in the bank of the St. Lawrence, which enables the river to flow into the completed part of the aqueduct that has been under construction for the past 12 years.
