K. D. Company and Canada Cutlery Put Kingston on the Map.

Last spring, a matter of nine or ten months ago, the people of the city voted on by-laws for several industries. Two of these were the K. D. Manufacturing Company and the Canada Cutlery Company, one situated far out on Montreal street on one side of the city, and the other on the site of the old Cereal Works on the other, yet both doing the same work of providing employment and boosting the city.

In both cases, young energetic men started in with determination to establish themselves in the business world. In the K. D. Company, H. Kelly and J. S. Driver did not see any reason why they should not make a success of their proposition and at the Canada Cutlery Company, C. A. Eaton got busy with a hammer and saw and started to build his factory.

As a result both industries are humming along and are fast becoming big factors in the city's business. The K. D. Company, starting in to make oval picture frames, has been compelled to add a large new building in the first year of its life. As an evidence of the spirit behind the company, the latest addition to the plant was left in such a manner that yet another addition can be made at any time. The firm has broken into lumber business with great success, makes boxes and piano cases, oval picture frames, fancy polished tea and serving trays, and parchment lamp shades in art designs, and many other articles. About two dozen men are employed at present and the prospects for the future are unlimited.

The Canada Cutlery Company is another such industry. "Made in Kingston" can easily be labelled all over it. From the office to the tools which turn out the knives, stairways, dies, cutting tools and all sorts of equipment were made on the premises. Then, with everything "set," the business of making knives started and Kingston now has the only factory of its kind in Canada. The local hardware stores carry this line and it gives such satisfaction that demand for it is rapidly growing. The price is more moderate than most lines and the quality cannot be excelled.

These two factories amply justified the trust of the people. They said that they meant business and they have proved it. Random Shots. The prospects for British goods in Canada are bright, according to reports from manufacturers who are now back in the old country, after having explored avenues of trade here. Considerable new business is said to have been opened up lately, and it is said that manufacturers who come out to this country and examine the prospects of the market on the spot will be amply repaid for their trouble.

A decrease of over nine million dollars in cattle alone harded at the Alberta stock yards in Calgary is shown for the eleven months ending November 30th, as compared with the same period two years ago. In 1919 the total number of cattle marketed in that period was 145,164, while this year it was only 72,615. The decrease in value amounts to \$9,071,560, after a conservative average price was taken for each of the periods.

Preliminary estimates of the dried fruit production in California this season indicate slightly reduced output compared with 1920. Apples are the only exception, being placed at 7,000 tons for the 1921 season, against 5,000 last year. Other dried fruits are given as follows: Apricots, 8,500, against 11,000; figs, 6,000, against 11,000; peaches, 20,000, against 26,000; prunes, 85,000, against 100,000.

The American sardine pack this year is claimed to be the smallest since 1901. Reports from Eastport, Maine, the centre of the American Atlantic sardine industry, estimates the total pack at slightly under 1,000,000 cases, against 3,000,000 cases in 1919, and an average of 2,500,000 cases. The prosperity of the industry, which is the chief support of such towns as Eastport and Lubec, is altogether dependent on the regularity of the supply of small herrings, which are the American sardine. The opening price for these last spring was \$5 a hoghead, but lately it has been advanced as high as \$10, with occasional sales at \$15. Packers are looking for even higher prices before the spring, as old stocks are rapidly disappearing.
