THE CHRISTMAS LETTER

Of Bishop Bidwell to the Anglicans of Diocese of Ontario.

In connection with the Christmas festival of the Anglican church, the following letter from the Bishop of Ontario, F. J. Bidwell, will be read in all the churches of the diocese on Sunday:

My dear people: It is my privilege to send to you all once more a Christmas letter. The birthday of our dear Lord, who for us men, and for our salvation, as at this time, came down from Heaven and took upon Himself our human nature, will shortly be celebrated by all Christians. As you look forward to the commemoration of this most wonderful event, there are certain thoughts which I would have you bear in mind.

First, at this present juncture, I beg you to think of Him as the Prince of Peace. The late terrible war was often spoken of as a "war to end war." It has not ended war. Far from it. There are many dark clouds on the horizon already threatening the precarious peace which at present exists. No war, however decisive, will ever end war. Only one force can effect that, the spirit of the Prince of Peace, Christ Jesus our Lord. Will the world ever realize that the only hope of the world lies
