## UPTONS AND BRYANT ARE TO APPEAR IN POLICE COURT ON MONDAY MORNING

Napanee People Are Greatly Excited Over the Arrests in Kingston—Bryant Was Detained by the Police Last August on Suspicion.

The Upton brothers and Fred Bryant, arrested on a number of serious charges, will come up for their preliminary hearing before Magistrate Farrell on Monday morning.

This announcement was made officially on Saturday morning. The list of charges each one will have to answer to, had not been made out Saturday forenoon, but it was stated that the crown would be ready to go on with some of the charges on Monday.

The arrest of the three young men caused quite a sensation at Napanee. Chief of Police Barrett, Napanee, was in Kingston on Wednesday, and on his return home that evening, a crowd of three hundred people were congregated at the station, as it was believed that the chief was bringing back the three young prisoners with him. The crowd was disappointed when they found that the chief did not have the prisoners in custody.

The Whig was in communication with the authorities at Napanee on Friday night, and was informed that the papers charging the Upton boys and Fred Bryant had been issued, and that they would be brought to Napanee for trial after the charges the local police have lodged against them are disposed of.

The charges against the three young men at Napanee include the murder of Constable Robert Beard, breaking into the garage of J. W. Robinson and stealing an auto; and attempting to break into the jewelry store of Smith Bros.

### Was Detained Once.

Frederick Bryant, now being held by the local police on the charge of being implicated in the murder of Police Constable Beard at Napanee, and on other serious charges to be lodged by the local police, was detained at the police station for a few minutes, on the evening in August when R. S. Waldron's car was stolen. This was the information given to the Whig on Friday.

On that occasion Bert Abernethy, shoe merchant, was responsible for his arrest. It appears that the previous evening Mr. Abernethy and other people who reside on Albert street were awakened from their slumbers by some person prowling around that neighborhood. Mr. Abernethy was determined that he would be on the lookout the following night. When he was going home about eleven o'clock he saw a suspicious-looking man near his home, so he thought he would follow him. The stranger evidently saw Mr. Abernethy watching and started down Earl street. At times the fellow would run, and Mr. Abernethy would also run. During the chase, the man tried a number of front doors.

After the chase lasted for some time Mr. Abernethy got in touch with the police, and two constables and the "Black Maria" arrived on the scene and the stranger, who turned

out to be Frederick Bryant, was caught after one shot had been fired by a constable. He was taken to the police station but was only detained a few minutes and then allowed his freedom. Bryant on that occasion was wearing khaki trousers, leather leggings, a peak cap and no collar. He was told to report to the police station the following morning and he obeyed the order. It is now thought that after leaving the police station that night he was one of the party who stole the Waldron automobile, as a man answering to this description was seen standing near the home of Mr. Waldron a short time before the car was stolen.

It is thought that after the automobile was stolen, the Upton brothers took charge of it until Bryant reported to the police the following morning, and he then rejoined them. Later in the day the shooting of Police Constable James Cotter near Latimer, took place.

The description of Bryant given by Mr. Abernethy and the description of one of the men in the Waldron car when Constable Cotter was shot tally very closely.

It is announced that some of the jewelry stolen from Mahood Bros. store has been recovered as the result of searches made by the Kingston police after the arrest of the Uptons and Bryant.

### Money For Trial.

Although the Upton brothers and Frederick Bryant have not appeared in police court to answer to the charges against them, the former, employers of the young men, have signified their desire to see that they get a square trial. Norman Crothers, of the firm of W. J. Crothers and Company, who employed two of the prisoners, communicated with the law firm of Cunningham and Smith, and stated that he was willing to provide money to see that the boys get a good legal defence. George Masoud, ice cream dealer, Princess street, is willing to put up money for the defence of one of the boys who worked for him.

### Busy Recovering Goods.

The police working on the various cases have had a busy time unearthing stolen goods, and although nothing has been given out officially, it is understood that a good deal of stolen property has been recovered and will be produced when the cases come before the court.

There was a report that the police had recovered goods on Cedar Island, but this story was denied by the police department. The police searched Cedar Island but it is stated that they did not get anything.

The police have been following up many clues for stolen goods and many of them have proved to be wild goose chases. But this is something the police are always up against.
