ADDITIONAL CHARGES AGAINST THE UPTONS

May Be Heard on Thursday—Bryant is Also to Be Tried.

The two Upton boys and Fred Bryant, held by the local police on serious charges, were taken back to the jail following the hearing in the police court on Monday morning.

On Thursday mornings a charge will be taken up against Fred Bryant and it is understood that some additional charges will also be made against the Upton boys. The crown is busily engaged on the case, and no information is being given out.

In the case of the shooting of Constable James Cotter, no charges of this nature can be heard for a time at least as Constable Cotter is quite ill again. He is suffering from weakness from the wound in his arm. He has been compelled to remain off duty twice since he reported for duty. He worked part of last week and then was compelled to give up.

The Upton boys, although they have only lived in the city about five years, are every well known to a wide circle of friends, and their arrest on such serious charges has been much commented on, their friends stating that they cannot understand their position. The Upton boys were connected with a Kingston Sunday school and it is stated that they took a prominent part in the work of the school.

Frederick Bryant was married just a few weeks ago. He, too, is well known around the city.

The crown authorities at Napanee are ready to take over the three young prisoners as soon as the local police have prosecuted all the charges they have against them here.

At Napanee it is stated that the murderers of Constable Richard Beard threw away their guns after the killing and drove their car over Plety Hill. Also that they drove into Kingston before daylight and parked their car (the one stolen from J. W. Robinson, Napanee,) at the fair grounds.

The police have found that two of the young men under arrest were absent from their work the day following the theft of R. S. Waldron's car. One of them is known to have had a black eye the day after the shooting of Constable Cotter, and it is declared that a bullet grazed just underneath the eye, causing discoloration. He wore a bandage over it then.
