BIG SUPPORT IS NEEDED INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

For the Jock Hartly Rink—A Big Mortgage is Carried.

Thanks to the generosity of James T. Richardson, the William Hartly family and the Athletic Board of Control at Queen's University, Kingston has now boast of having one of the best rugby stadiums and skating rinks in Canada.

For years there had been a feeling that the hockey and rugby teams which represented Kingston would always be handicapped on account of not having a large enough place to play the games. It will be remembered that about two years ago when the athletic committee of Queen's University showed James T. Richardson the need of an up-to-date stadium he immediately said that he would donate the stadium in memory of his brother the late Captain George T. Richardson, who made the supreme sacrifice during the great war. It required two years to build the new stadium, but when it was completed it was pronounced one of the best in the Dominion. Mr. Richardson spent about \$110,000 on the stadium.

At the same time the erection of the stadium was underway, the men at Queen's University who were directing the athletic programme realized that it was necessary to have an up-to-date rink at once. A committee was formed to make a canvass. The campaign was underway a couple of days when it was announced that the sum of \$25,000 towards the erection of the rink as a memorial to the late "Jock" Hartly, a graduate of the college, who died in London. The unanimous decision of the Queen's athletic committee was to go ahead with the erection as they realized that the remainder of the money could be secured at some future date. The committee decided that the new rink would be called after Jock Hartly who had done so much to advance athletics, especially hockey, at the university.

Those in charge of the building said that the work could be completed by Christmas and they proved to be correct in their prophecy. The contractors and workmen did everything in their power to rush the work along.

Now that the rink is almost ready to be taken out of the hands of the contractors, the university authorities face a big financial obligation which can only be met by the co-operation on the part of the student body and the citizens of Kingston at large. It is a well known fact that hundreds of citizens had been anxious to follow the local hockey matches but would not stand in line for hours to get reserved tickets, to say nothing about going over to the old covered rink three hours before the games were called and freeze. The new rink will mean the teams will have hundreds more followers.

The athletic board of control has arranged the rink so that there will be seating accommodation for about 3,500 people and rush seats and standing room for about 1,500.

If the big mortgage is to be reduced on the rink this winter, it can only be done by the students and the citizens attending as many games as possible. The prices have been so fixed that it will not "break" any person to witness the exhibition. The Queen's authorities are looking forward to putting an artificial ice plant in by next year.

At the present time the ice makers have about twelve inches of ice on in some places, and they expect that if the cold weather continues there will be eighteen inches of ice in the very near future.

NON. DUNCAN MARSHALL
Of Alberta Legislature Speaks at Commercial Travellers' Banquet.
The commercial travellers of Kingston held their annual banquet in the Hotel Frontenac on Thursday evening, and the special speaker for the occasion was Hon. Duncan Marshall, M.P.P., Alberta legislature. There were one hundred and fifty present, including guests, and all were impressed by the address of Mr. Marshall whose subject was "Immigration and Agricultural Development." The speaker contended that Canada's development was in the hands of her native sons who were best adapted to meet the conditions of life and climate. He ridiculed such ideas as "back to the land" campaigns and indiscriminate immigration from European countries. Neither was it fair to expect young men to flock to any farming section and make a success, as no man can till until after three or four months trial how he will like any proposition. But the development of agriculture in Canada is mainly in the hands of the farming people, and it is for them to so instruct the young people that their ambition may be to make a success of every branch of their calling.
Hon. Mr. Marshall is a western farmer and he knows all that is required in agricultural life. He is a stock-breeder and a truly representative Canadian business man, but in addition he is a very effective speaker and an authority on important public questions at the present time.
