"PARLOR, BEDROOM, BATH"

Is What the Rex Company is Playing at the Grand.

How to live up to a dark past, which never happened—is the deep problem which the young husband had to solve in "Parlor, Bedroom and Bath," as presented by the Rex Stock Company at the Grand on Thursday evening. Unfortunately, for himself at least, the hero was greatly puzzled as to what methods he should employ to hold the affections of his bride, whom he loved very dearly and again unfortunately, he placed himself in the hands of a friend of his who was nothing if not original as a "home-breaker." This friend with the aid of a clever girl reporter who specialised on "gossipy" news items for a "yellow" newspaper, managed to stage a plot which rapidly thickened far beyond the promoters' expectations, being complicated by some "hairbrain" originality on the part of the hero himself.

The main action of the play, as the title suggests, takes place in one of those "two-by-four" apartments in a great New York hotel, and when friend wife arrives on the scene to find not one woman but several, to say nothing of pink "piejams" and—well, things begin to get maddening for the participants and "side-splitting" for the audience.

This production is easily the best given by Rex and Company in this city, and the crowded house showed their approval and pleasure in a manner which would satisfy even the most dubious press-agent. Rex as the young husband was his usual rollicking self, while Zana Vaughn fitted the opposite role to a nicety. William Mitchell as "Jeff," the promoter of the general mix-up, surpassed himself for mirth-making while the remainder of the cast were better than ever, and no further comment is necessary for Kingston theatre-goers. A splendid impression was made by Miss Florence Winters, who made her first appearance in this city. The vaudeville "stunts" by Hazel Williams and Billy Seymour were exceptionally good, and the Park Kiddies also deserve notice.

From every angle, the show is splendid and shouldn't be missed by those who really wish to see the best. On Friday evening the same play will be given, and also at the special matinee on Saturday, and for the last time on New Year's Eve.
