Busy Season Ahead for Tri-Color Players in the Intercollegiate and O.H.A.

Queen's University puckchasers have a lot of work cut out for them this winter and are hard at practice and training under "Billie" Hughes, Citizens downtown this last night or so have had a smile to themselves to see "Billie" chasing the players home to bed as ten o'clock approached. The Military College is concentrating on Intercollegiate Hockey this winter and will win or just about break necks in the attempt. The same conditions apply to the junior intercollegiate, though the formidable tri-color juniors are confident that they can hold their own against the cadets.

In the O.H.A. little can be said until after the first game. Judging from practices Queen's and Frontenacs are fairly evenly matched and the intermediate teams from Belleville, Brockville and Cornwall can be expected to turn in good performances.

In the junior series Queen's stand excellent chances for the group, at least. Last year they went to the finals with Stratford and the team is practically intact with the addition of Boucher, the whirlwind from Sudbury, who played Kingston's product, Bill Cooke, neck and neck last season. Neither Cornwall nor Frontenacs juniors played championship hockey on Monday night, but they, of course will improve as the season advances.

On the whole the outlook is good for Queen's and the fans will have enough games to watch, that is certain. Since the re-commencement of classes at the university after the holidays the players have all come back and all is bright for the future.

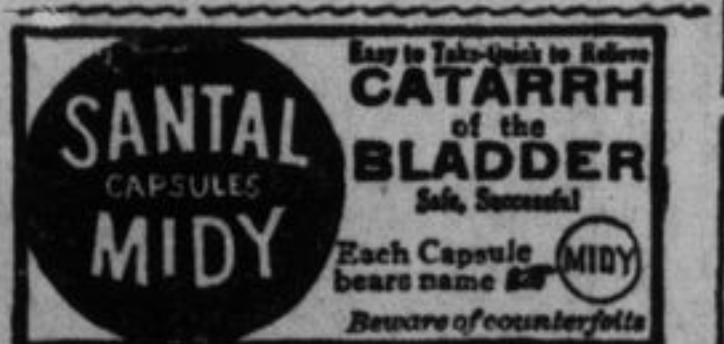
WILSON IS SUSPENDED.
