the Kingston Dairy school, will be
among the speakers. It is expect-
ed that five hundred delegates will
be in attendance at the convention.
Between five hundred and six hun-
dred pounds of butter will be on ex-
hibition. Mr. Publow will give a re-
port on the year's work.

The Late Switzer Conway.

Switzer Conway, who was in his
ninety-second year, died at the home
of his son-in-law, J. H. Butler, 23
Barton ave., Toronto, on Tuesday.
Deceased was born in Napanee, Ont.,
and was employed by the Cowiter
Scott Company, Oshawa, Ont., for 30
years. For the past seven years he
had lived in Toronto, and until re-
cently had been in fairly good health.
His wife predeceased him several
years ago. Four generations were
present at his bedside when he pass-
ed away.

Alliance Francaise Meets.

A meeting of the Alliance Fran-
caise took place in the Red room,
Queen's University on Wednesday
evening, and an enjoyable social
time was spent. There were over
thirty members present and all con-
versation was carried on in French.
The membership now exceeds forty.
Prof. Vattier told of a recent meet-
ing of the Montreal group, which was
addressed by Mr. Steed, an English
journalist, and he announced that in
March, Mr. Bessonier, president of
the Montreal group, will be the guest
of the Kingston group and will de-
liver an address.

Visiting in Prescott.

Miss Harriet Mastine, Belleville,
is visiting her mother, Mrs. A. Mc-
Laughlin, and her sister, Mrs. H. E.
Wallace, Prescott. Miss Mastine
was one of the most noted nurses in
the Canadian Army. She went over-
seas with No. 7 General Canadian
Hospital Corps formed at Queen's
University, Kingston, in 1915, and
spent three months in a Red Cross
hospital at Clivedon. She was trans-
ferred to Etaples, France, where she
served three years. She also spent
some time at Frevant, Albert, Bus,
and Etaracourt. Miss Mastine was
cited for the Croix de Guerre and re-
ceived two other medals for her
splendid work.

Rev. Alex. White, Renfrew, Dead.
Rev. Alexander White, pastor of

the Baptist congregation, Renfrew,
Ont., died on Tuesday after a short
illness. He was born in Ireland
eighty-three years ago and, coming
to Canada as a youth, settled in Tor-
onto. His first charge was in St.
John, N.B. He became pastor of
Renfrew Baptist Congregation in
December, 1915.

To Leave on Feb. 1st.

Miss E. M. Allan, teacher of clas-
sics at the Prescott high school, has
tendered her resignation to accept a
similar one at Weston, eight miles
from Toronto. Miss Allan has re-
turned to Prescott to resume her
duties at the high school, where she
will remain until February.

John R. Artis at Rest.

John R. Artis passed peacefully
away at the family residence in Tyen-
dinaga on Tuesday after a short ill-
ness, aged seventy-six years. At one
time he was a successful business
man of Belleville. He leaves a
family of one son, Samuel R. Artis,
and four daughters: Mrs. Gleason,
Buffalo; Mrs. Plain, Madoc; Mrs.
Craig, Tyendinaga; Mrs. Huff, Tyen-
dinaga. He was an Anglican in re-
ligion.
