Oliver Marier had a creditable record of service overseas and was in hospital in Kingston for a considerable time after his return. He never completely recovered from the effects of serious injuries received on active service. Besides his mother and brother, the deceased, who was thirty-six years of age and unmarried, is survived by one sister, Mrs. Allen McEwan, Toronto.

Burgess, Adjt. Condie, the president, W. Taylor Dale, and secretary, F. J. Wilson.

At 5:30 a short devotional meeting was conducted by Rev. Dr. Wilson, following which the ministerial brethren all partook of a tempting supper served by Chalmers' church ladies.

The recent Week of Prayer was discussed and one or two suggestions made regarding future meetings. Among these being that next year consideration be given to the arrangement of the meetings to meet the city's need geographically. Another suggestion from Principal Dyde was that the idea of united prayer meetings be carried out other times during the year than simply during the special week.

The matter of services at the Mowat and Sydenham hospitals was discussed, and inasmuch as all the minister had been assisting by providing services at these hospitals on Sunday mornings, and feeling that these services certainly do not meet the need of the hospital patients, a strong resolution was passed to be signed by all the ministers of the various churches and others urging the proper authorities to appoint a chaplain who could give the men who have fought our battles some kind of adequate service along spiritual lines to which they are justly entitled.

A splendid paper setting forth the "Baptist Viewpoint" was given by Rev. J. S. Laflair, and on motion of Canon Fitzgibbon, seconded by Mr. Duncan, a hearty vote of thanks was passed to the speaker.
