Mrs. S. Sheppard, King street west, is unable to attend to her duties, having received injuries from a fall while working in her home.

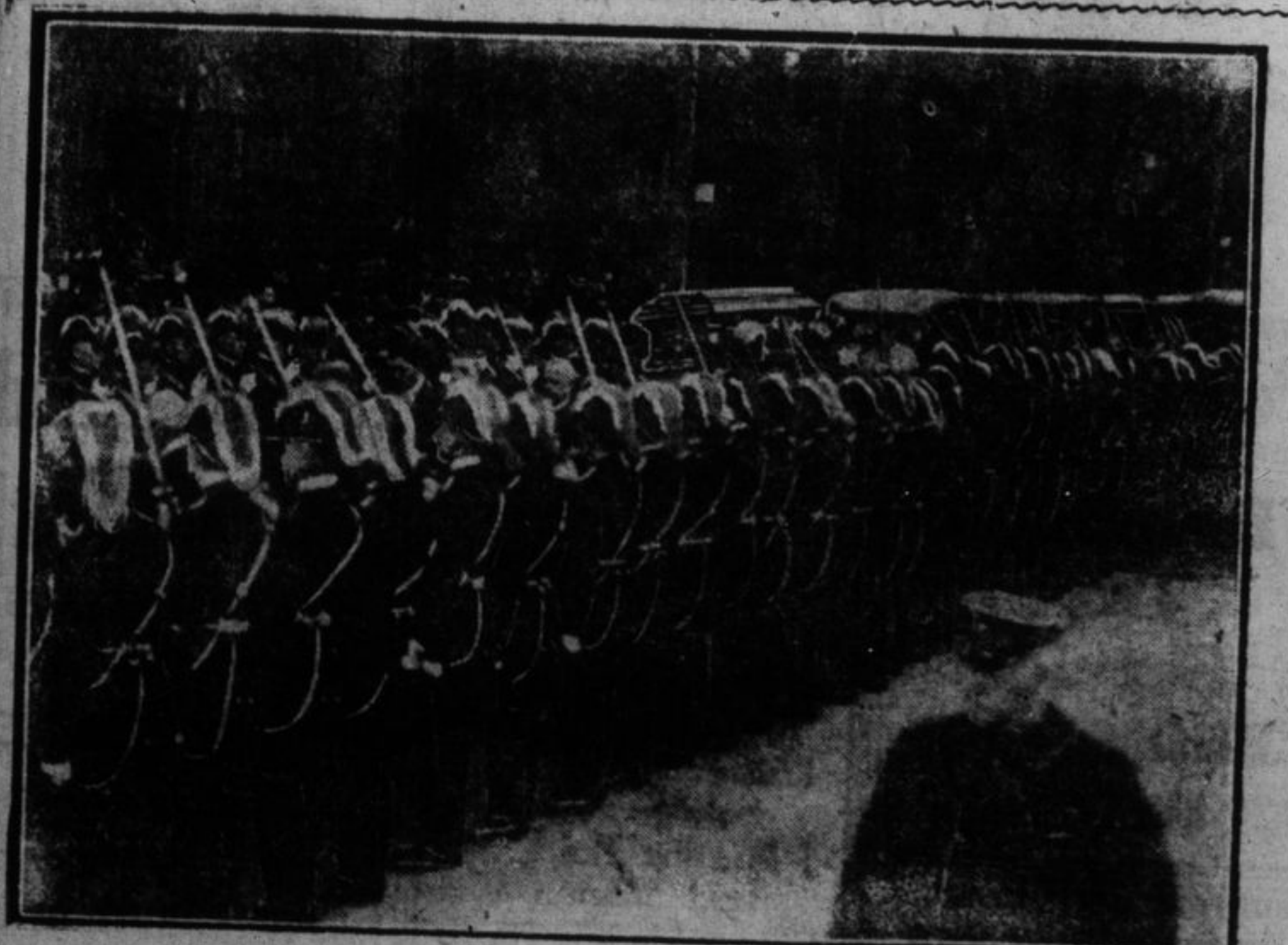
