### KINGSTON ROTARY CLUB

Rotarian A. N. Lyster Delivered an Instructive Address on Banking.

Rotarian Arthur Lyster, of the Kingston branch, Bank of Nova Scotia, was the special speaker at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club on Friday afternoon, and he gave a most interesting and instructive address on the banking and commercial systems of ancient Babylonia. That the Rotarians are as adept in the art of listening, as they are undoubtedly expert in extemporaneous speaking and singing was easily evident by the close attention with which the gathering gave to the speaker.

In opening his address, Rotarian Lyster sketched some of the early history of Babylonia, and told of some of the conditions of the country about 4500 B.C. This country, the speaker remarked, was no doubt, the cradle of the human race and this makes the study of banking institutions all the more interesting. The district is enclosed by the two great rivers of Western Asia, the Tigris and the Euphrates, and the majority of the land being low-lying and marshy, the country was greatly subject to floods in the spring. In spite of the disadvantages of this, the land became very fertile by these alluvial deposits and when the people had learned to construct dikes, the district became very prosperous as a result of its agricultural development. The country soon teemed with an industrious population, while the history of this civilization has but recently been made known to us by the decipherment of the native documents and historical records preserved in the form of clay slabs. Excavations, which were started by the Germans about 1900, establish absolute evidence that these people had a great system of banking, and could draw up legal forms and documents of every kind just as well as we can at the present day.

About the time of Nebuchadnezzar, famous in bible history, a form of currency, gold and silver began to appear, while the rate of interest in vogue at that time varied from 10 to 16 1/2 per cent. This was, at first, collected monthly, but later this was changed to the yearly method, thus showing the evolution of our modern system. The speaker then discussed the methods of a certain large firm of that time, which probably corresponds to the great Rothschild firm, and which apparently handled most of the banking transactions of that time. One of the features of this old system, was that debt was not as severely punished, in that old civilization, as it has been under our old English laws in fairly recent years.

A number of interesting documents were then read by the speaker, being translations of the original slabs excavated in the ruins of these ancient cities, and they proved that the people at that time were possessed of a good business sense, as well as being fair and above-board in their dealings. One good feature of their old laws, was that if a person failed to pay a creditor, the debtor was forced to work as the others slave until the debt was cleared. Mr. Lyster closed his address by remarking that it was well for moderns to look back and study these people and their methods.

Rotarian Harry Miller, in moving a vote of thanks to the speaker, remarked that he had found the address most interesting, and far from dry, as humorously hinted by Mr. Lyster. The vote was most heartily given by the Rotarians.

Rotarian H. E. Pense remarked that he was sure that the singing could be improved, and that for the benefit of visitors especially, some rehearsals should be conducted.

Rotarian "Syl" Grace then pretended to be greatly offended at the

criticism and slyly suggested that perhaps the entertainments could be improved if some of the "fault-finders" should join the committee. This evoked much merriment and it was finally decided to form the following committee: Chairman, "Syl" Grace, Harry Pense, Harry Miller, Harry Braithwaite, Rex Snelgrove, "Matt" Graham and Charles Anglin.

Some new songs were introduced, under the leadership of Rotarian Grace, who announced himself as a "Singer", and wore enthusiastically rendered by the Rotarians.

Rotarian Leman A. Guild, vice-president, acted as chairman, in the absence of President "Joe" Stewart, who was announced as being "in Florida, looking for a peanut of large dimensions" so that his exertions of rolling it from the Standard Bank to the Nova Scotia Bank, would be eliminated as much as possible. This in conformity with a verdict rendered at the mock trial on the preceding week.
