ZITA REACHES ZURICH.
 Swiss Government to Keep Sharp Eye on Her.

Geneva, Jan. 14.—Former Empress Zita, travelling incognito, with a maid and handbag, her heavy luggage probably coming later, arrived at Zurich from Basle under the supervision of Dr. Egger and several Swiss detectives. She was delighted to meet several of her children at the station. Accompanied by Dr. Clairmont, she drove to the clinic above Zurich, where the operation on her son shortly will be performed.

The Swiss papers state that Zita, who is considered an intriguer and the head of the Hapsburg restoration movement in Europe, must be watched closely during her short stay in the country, in order that the Swiss Government may not be fooled for the third time by her intrigues.
