AN INSURANCE BANQUET

The Manufacturers' Company Field Force Have a Very Jovial Time.

The third annual banquet of the field force of the Kingston agency of The Manufacturers Life Insurance Company was held at the British American Hotel Friday night and was certainly a great success.

Read, of Sydenham, to speak, mentioned that he felt he was entitled to special mention for the reason that during the month of December he had written \$43,000 new business, which was the largest volume of business ever written by any agent in one month during the history of the Kingston agency. The success of the evening was largely contributed to by the entertainment given by Messrs. Elder, Mackie and Fern.

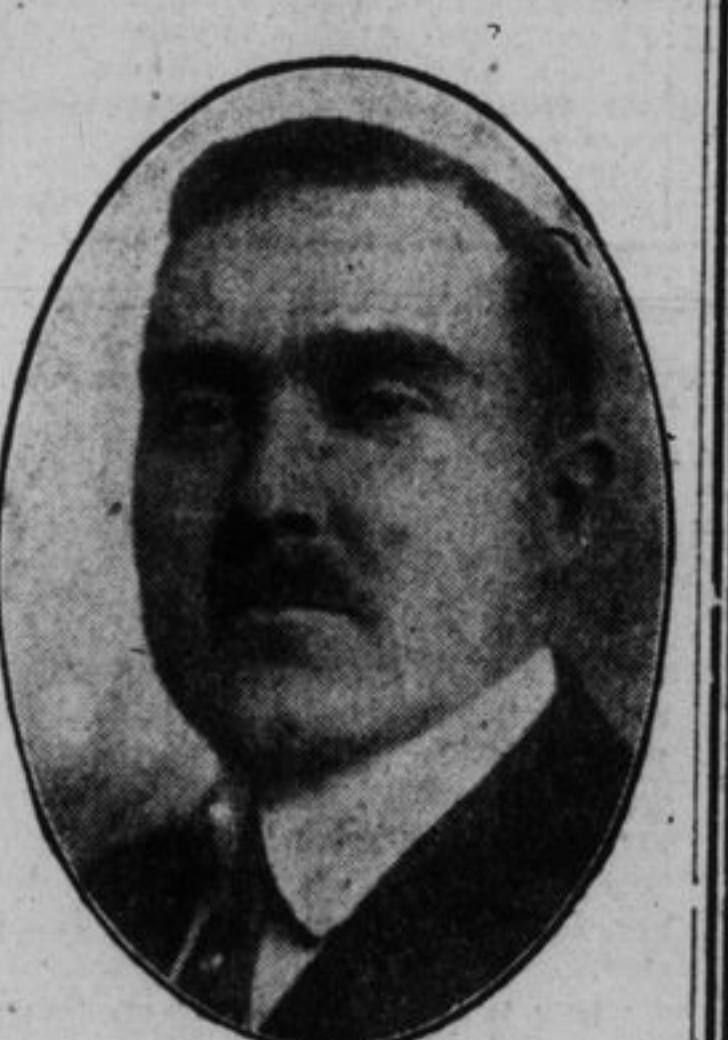
