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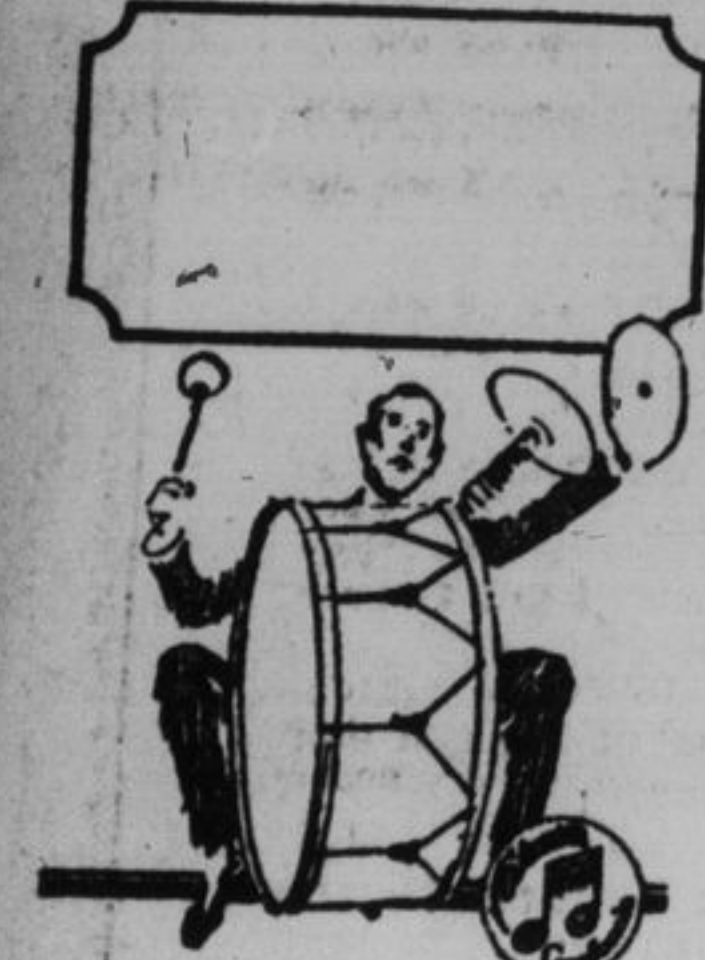

Three County Hockey Games on Saturday

The County Hockey league was officially opened on Saturday afternoon when three good games were played. The winners were Verona, Catarauqui and Glenburnie. This year the league is divided into three groups. Verona won from Sydenham by 3 to 1. Catarauqui defeated Barrieffield by 3 to 2 and Glenburnie got a 2 to 1 victory over Sunbury.

Judging from the attendance at the games on Saturday the league will be a record breaker this season. The lady rooters were out in full force and cheered.

The different teams have spent considerable time in getting their rinks in order for the season. One thing that was noticeable in all the games was the very friendly spirit which existed among the players. This is one of the most essential things towards the advancement of clean sport, and it is to be hoped that it will continue during the entire season.

Catarauqui Defeated Barrieffield.

The Catarauqui team was the winner of a very closely contested game played in the village of Catarauqui on Saturday afternoon when it defeated Barrieffield by a score of 3 to 2. The game was won in the last minute of play, when Shewell planted the rubber for the final tally. The score at the end of the first period stood 1 to 1, and in the second twenty minutes of play neither team was able to register. It was almost impossible to say which was the better team as both were very evenly matched. Catarauqui players tended to play more combination and took advantage of the openings. For the winners, Shewell was by far the outstanding man. He was able to break up the rushes of the opposing team, and carried the puck down the ice on numerous occasions. Jackson, the right wing man, played a good game, and did his best to work combination play. Barry, at centre, played a heady game, but seemed to be somewhat handicapped due to an injury received to his ankle during the summer months while playing baseball. Harold Simpson, the net guardian, and Polk, on the defence, were in the game all the time.

The Barrieffield team was a very husky organization, and worked well. Numerous combination plays were attempted but they seemed to fall flat a couple of times, due to the centre player, Warrington, not being there to receive the pass. The Barrieffield defence was exceptionally good, and both defence players are experts at rushing up and down the ice. "Ted" Stanton, was probably the outstanding man on the team. Warrington at centre is a very speedy player. The teams were somewhat handicapped on account of practice, but they will show wonderful improvement in the very near future.

The hockey club, and the Community club of Catarauqui are to be congratulated on the splendid ice surface they have arranged. The rink, which is built in the hollow close to the railroad track, on the left hand side of the road going out to the village, is up-to-date in every respect. Boards have been placed around to the height of two feet, and there is an excellent lighting system for use in the evenings. The club house, where the people put on their skates, is well fitted out, and has a good large stove. Arrangements have been made to flood the rink with water which is carried in barrels from a spring near by.

The first period showed Catarauqui working hard but Barrieffield seemed to have a little edge of the play at times. Shewell was penalized one minute for tripping. The play had been under way sixteen minutes when E. Stanton, Barrieffield, made the first goal after a long rush. Larry, the centre player on Catarauqui team, tried to score just as the bell rang for the completion of the period.

When the second period opened Warrington of Barrieffield drew a two minute penalty for a trip. "Ted" Stanton rushed continually, while Catarauqui forwards missed numerous chances to score.

In the third period, E. Stanton and Cliff were both penalized for mixing things up. George Shewell rushed the full length of the ice and put Catarauqui in the lead after twelve minutes of play, but three minutes later, Warrington of Bar-

rieffield tied the score again. With one minute to play Shewell got a pass from the corner when he was directly in front of the Barrieffield goal, and won the game for Catarauqui by a neat shot.

Glenburnie Was Winner.

Glenburnie hockey team came out on top of the opening game of Group No. 3 of the county hockey league played at Sunbury on Saturday afternoon when it defeated Sunbury by a score of 2 to 1. The game was a first class exhibition considering that some of the players have not had time enough to get into condition. The boys from Sunbury suffered most on account of condition but they had a little more team play than the winners. In the first period, Howard Gordon, of Sunbury, was hurt on two occasions and had to retire from the game for about five minutes. When he did return to the ice he was rather dazed on account of the puck striking him in the face. For the winners, E. Hogan and Orr, the goal tender, played a great exhibition of hockey. The Glenburnie defence composed of some good hockey and were able to keep the fast Sunbury wing men from getting in close on the net.

The first period showed some very ragged hockey and neither team was able to get the rubber into the net. During the second twenty minutes, both teams tried desperately to score but could not get in close enough. There was a disputed goal, but Referee Reid said the puck did not pass the posts. Noble, of Sunbury, made the first score of the game after a pass from George. Near the end of the second twenty minutes of play E. Hogan scored on a pass from Emmerson.

In the last period, both teams were trying to break the tie which existed, but the Glenburnie boys were showing the effects of a little better condition. R. Hogan carried the puck from one end of the rink to the other and scored the "hunk" which won the game.

The game was featured with some very good checking. The ice was in perfect condition. The boys of Sunbury are to be congratulated on the excellent rink which they have built. The members of the fair sex are taking great interest in the teams and were out in force on Saturday.

Glenburnie and Sunbury are both new teams in the county hockey league and judging from the brand of hockey put up on Saturday afternoon they will be heard from before the season is over. It takes considerable time to get a hockey team in good working order, but the management of both teams are confident that the boys will put up a brand of hockey which will be a credit to the league.

Verona 3, Sydenham 1.

Verona hockey team won the first game of Group No. 1 of the County Hockey league on Saturday afternoon at Verona when it defeated Sydenham by a score of 3 to 1. The game was a very good exhibition of hockey considering that some of the players have not got into condition as yet. The score at the end of the first period was 1 to 0 in favor of the winners, and the second period the Verona boys added another counter which made the score 2 to 0. The play was very fast at the commencement of the conflict, but it slowed up considerably on account of the lack of condition of some of the players.

One of the scores which was made by the Verona outfit caused considerable argument, but the referee said it counted. Sydenham A. Lee and Young of Sydenham worked hard, while Craig and Williams were Verona's best. Both goal tenders had considerable work to do, but they

were successful in saving many sure shots. Revells, net guardian for Verona, turned in a wonderful game, and his defence was air tight. The Sydenham defence played loose and the Verona players took full advantage of this. Garvin, the Sydenham goaler, was subject to much close-in shooting. The Sydenham team suffered considerably on account of not having good substitutes. When Woodruff arrived the team tightened up considerably. The game opened with both teams shooting many times at the nets, but the goalers were able to clear. The game had been going for ten minutes when Merrill got the puck from a scramble in front of the Sydenham net and hammered it in for the first score. Both teams worked for all that was in them but the period ended without any more score being made.

The second period showed a great deal of speed, but condition seemed to show on some of the players. Craig carried the puck for some distance and scored on a bounding shot from the left side of the rink. Young for Sydenham carried the puck down to the Verona goal and only missed a counter by a couple of inches. A. Lee and Williams rushed the ice but could not register. When the third twenty minutes commenced R. Woodruff the crack player of the Sydenham outfit had arrived and seemed to strengthen their attack. Craig of Verona worked the puck down into Sydenham end of the rink and shot. The goal judge contended that the puck did not enter the net, but the referee over ruled him and awarded the goal to Verona. There was considerable discussion over the goal and the spectators ran out on the ice.

Trousdale rushed down the full length but was blocked before he could shoot. Sydenham broke away and A. Lee scored the only counter made by his team. Sydenham were playing their whole team up.

The rink, where the game was played, was in first-class condition and there were many hockey fans present for the conflict.
