TWO YEARS OF PROHIBITION IN THE UNITED STATES

Billions in Money Values Have Vanished Since the Law Was Put Into Effect—Costs High to Government.

National Prohibition became effective in name two years ago. The dry date was Jan. 17th, 1920.
To ascertain to what degree it has become effective in fact The World two weeks ago began a national survey through its own correspondents. The survey covered 148 cities of a total population of more than 28,000,000, in forty-four states encompassing 97,000,000 of the total 105,000,000 population of the United States.

It was a review of the operation of the Federal co-related state prohibition laws to ascertain what fruits they had borne. This article is not a commentary upon drink or drought; it is a presentation of country-wide conditions upon which prohibition might have a bearing.

The directions to The World correspondents read:
The World is seeking for the facts of the operation of the prohibition law during the year 1921. It desires to print what these impartial facts disclose. For comparison, it wishes to set the facts alongside the relative data of law enforcement of a year before the prohibition amendment became effective.

How many arrests were there for drunkenness in 1921? How many arrests for disorderly conduct? How many arrests for violating the federal and state liquor laws? What was the average population in jails, prisons and workhouses? What was the average population of almshouses and public orphanages? How many persons were summoned to court of domestic relations? How many arrests for thefts of liquor?

What were the sizes of police forces? Is a special liquor law police enforcement body required now, and if so, its size? What was the cost of liquor enforcement? What was the savings bank community total? What are the general law and order conditions? They were some of the questions.

Washington Statistics.

In the various departments in Washington available statistics were obtained showing the production and consumption of liquor, the quantity left, importations, arrests recorded by the Internal Revenue Service, the cost of prohibition to the government including loss of taxes, the legal entanglements entailed through enforcement, the loss to the liquor industry, comparison of deposits in national, state and savings banks as well as postal savings, mortgages on homes, illiteracy, infant mortality, school attendance, child labor and wages.

During the fiscal year ending last June 30th there were produced from materials other than fruit 86,367,658 taxable gallons of distilled spirits, a decrease of 13,250,133 gallons compared with the previous year. Of this amount of spirits there were removed from bonded warehouses on payment of tax 34,993,154 gallons, an increase of 6,772,245 gallons in a year.

in distillery and bonded warehouses last June was 49,890,858 gallons, a decrease of 5,972,892 gallons in bond in one year.

Production in 1916 was 249,123,951 gallons.
Last year there were 159 permits to manufacture intoxicating liquor renewed by the Internal Revenue Service and 546 new permits issued. Only one permit to import and sell was renewed, while 115 were issued. A total of 5,945 permits to use and sell was renewed and 10,286 new ones issued.

Production of wines and cordials last year was 19,551,595 gallons, and there were 27,694,893 gallons of wine on hand June 30th, an increase of 9,927,528 gallons in a year.

Internal Revenue Testimony.

Millard F. West, deputy commissioner of Internal Revenue, testified before the House Appropriations Committee on Treasury Appropriations, estimated there were on July 1st in distilleries and bonded warehouses 39,961,000 gallons of whiskey, 399,000 gallons of rum, 885,000 gallons of gin, 2,170 gallons of high wines, 640,946 gallons of alcohol and 360,000 gallons of neutral or change spirits—a rough total of 42,500,000 gallons.

Government statistics on the importation of liquors have brought forth some startling figures. They show that while the flow of brandy, gin, whiskey, cordials and liquor into this country dropped to 278,000 gallons in the calendar year 1920, it turned into a flood last year, with a total of 467,835 gallons for the first eleven months, and when the figures for the full year are compiled they are expected to show almost double importations over 1920. Board of Health records do not show a corresponding increase in illness requiring liquids "for medicinal purposes only."

Record of Importations.

At the average for the first eleven months last year, the total importations would be 510,429 gallons, or reckoning five bottles of imported goods to the gallon, 2,552,100 bottles.

The total spirits imported in 1916 were 3,777,038 gallons, of \$7,950,923 value.

Champagne and sparkling wines imported last year also showed an increase, but not as great a one. They amounted to 387,444 quarts in 1920 and 410,816 quarts in the first eleven months of 1921, \$4,479,520.

In value the total spirits, wines and imported malt liquors imported in 1916 was \$18,735,264; in 1920, \$2,269,364, and for the first eleven months of 1921, \$4,479,520.

The Internal Revenue records show there were 34,175 persons arrested in the fiscal year ending last June for violations of the Prohibition Act and the Internal Revenue laws relating to distilled spirits and wines. There were 10,991 stills seized, 9,746 distilleries, 413,987 gallons of spirits, 4,963,005 gallons of beer and 428,303 gallons of wine and cider. The appraised value of the property seized was \$10,906,687.53.

There were 16,610 pleas of guilty under the Prohibition Act and 3,297 under the Internal Revenue Act. There were 17,962 convictions under the Prohibition Act and 4,158 under the Revenue Act. There were 755 acquittals under the Prohibition Act and 683 under the Revenue Act.

Enforcement Highly Costly.

Enforcement of prohibition has been a costly proposition for the government. For the fiscal year ending June 30th last the appropriation was \$6,850,000. Of that amount \$8,203,474.01 has been billed. Bills under that appropriation will be put through the accounting channels for the next three years.

For the year ending next June \$6,750,000 was appropriated. That is for the current year. For the year beginning in July next \$9,250,000 was asked. The House Appropriations Committee in connection with the Treasury Appropriation Bill, recommended \$8,400,000, and the house approved that sum. This is for liquor enforcement alone and does not include the \$750,000 counted for narcotics.
