Sour Milk Waffles.

One egg. 2 cups sour milk, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons melted butter. Hix and sift dry ingredients. Add yolk of egg well beaten. Mix perfectly smooth and beat in melted butter. Add milk and beat with an open spoon or a strong dover beater. Fold in the white of the egg beaten stiff and dry. Put one tablespoonful of the batter in each section of the iron and cover. The iron should be hot enough to turn almost as soon as it is filled and covered. If an electric iron is used, add another tablespoonful of melted butter to the rule.


