evening when R.M.C. and Queen's third team try conclusions at the Jock Hartly Arena.

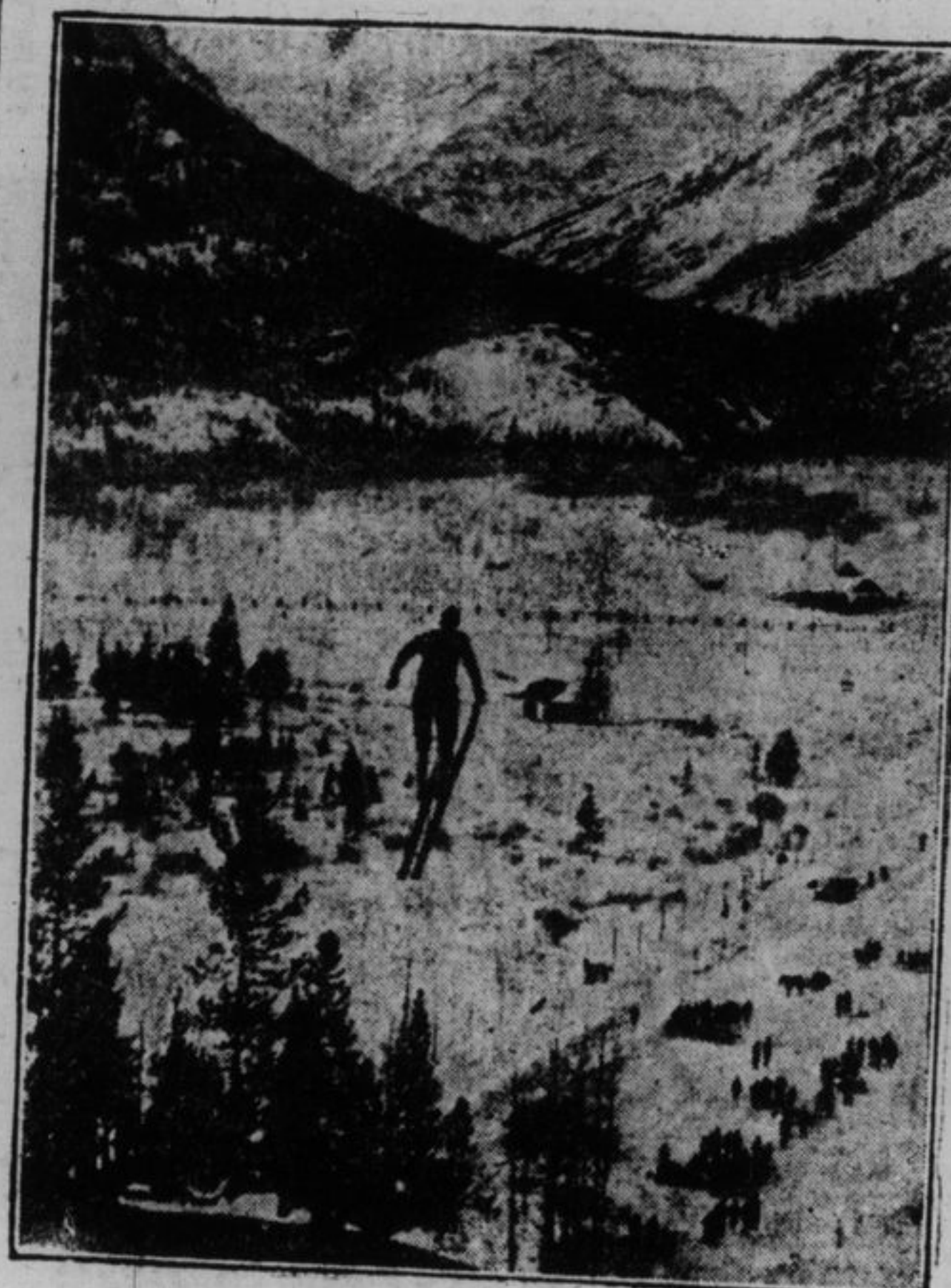
On the other hand, R.M.C. Juniors are striking nothing easy when they run up against Queen's III.

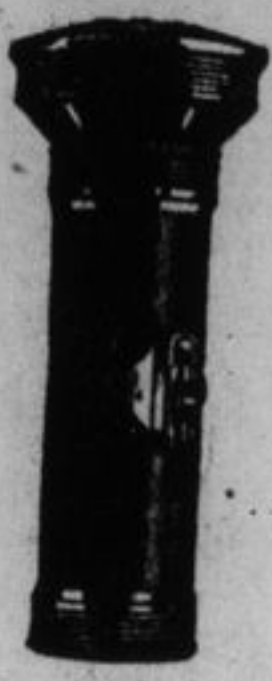
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BRINGING UP FATHER
