MATINEE FOR LADIES ONLY.

"The Unloved Wife" at the Grand Opera House.

Who was it said that "Women are seldom what they seem"? No matter, "tis true. CHARGE OF HERESY.

Against The Principal of Ripon Hall, Oxford, England.

By maintaining that the resurrection was a spiritual and not a physical event, Rev. H. D. A. Major, principal of Ripon Hall, Oxford, has been made the object of a detestation for heresy.

A copy of the Guardian just to hand from England gives the terms in which this charge was laid before the bishop of Oxford.

The accusation, which was made by Rev. Charles Edward Douglas, curate of St. Luke's, Camberwell, alleges that Mr. Major did "openly teach doctrine concerning the resurrection which is contrary to the Christian religion as set forth in the book of common prayer and in holy scripture, where the resurrection of the body is taught explicitly and is a vital element in the general theological and philosophical system." Mr. Major is also accused of "importing the teaching of a heathen mystic (Gastama) into the Christian religion which warrant of reason or of observed fact."

In an interview, Rev. Mr. Douglas disclaimed any desire to "lay down the law" but he added that for two years he had been waiting for an opportunity to state a case in order to get some authoritative decision on the subject of "the loose thinking and speaking with regard to the resurrection."
