## SOME REMARKABLE OVERTHROWS IN SPORT DURING THE YEAR 1921

Following the war days, enthusiasts with renewed energy injected into their various lines of sport increased energy with marvelous results. Keeping pace with the reconstruction period, sport of all sorts assumed a new lease of life in Canada. Professional and amateur sports, from the smallest hamlet to the metropolitan city, enjoyed a year of great prosperity. The community spirit was uppermost throughout Canada. While the United States and England stand foremost in the winning list of titles from the standpoint of volume, yet Canada still maintains her supremacy in certain lines of sport, especially the winter sports, in which her contenders have always emerged at the top of the ladder.

### Canadian Winners.

The Ottawa Senators, winners of the Stanley Cup, captured the world's championship for hockey, while the unbeatable university of Toronto team retained the Canadian Amateur Championship from the Brandon team in Winnipeg. The junior championship fell to Falcons, of Winnipeg. Of the gold champions Frank Thompson, of Toronto, came through with the Canadian amateur honors, while David Black, of Vancouver, annexed the professional gold championship. Miss Cecil Leitch, the famous English star, holder of the English and French championships, added the Canadian title to her string. Prominent among the skating champions, is Miss Gladys Robinson, of Toronto, who captured the woman's world championship skating title at Lake Placid.

### Billiards.

William Hoppe, one of the few champions who seemed to be able to go on forever, holding the 18.2 billiard title, was finally dethroned by Young Jake Schaefer, whose father held the title before Hoppe.

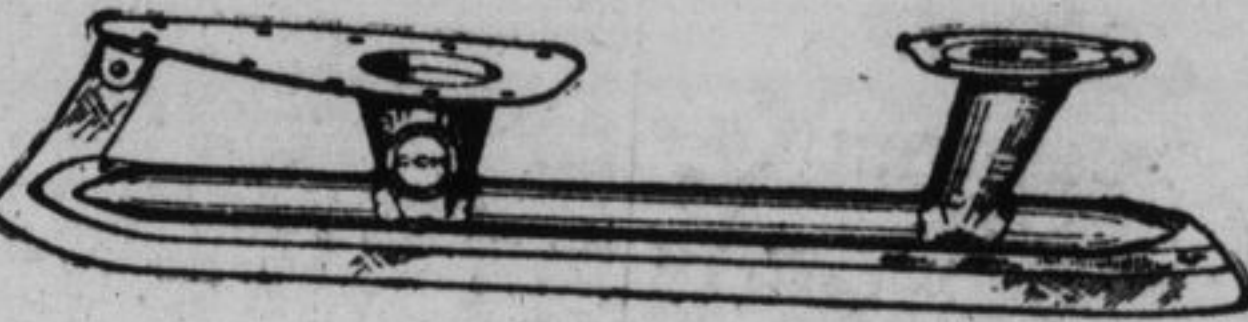
