### THE BOARD OF TRADE APPOINTS DELEGATION

To Assist Milk Producers in Urging Rebuilding of the Dairy School.

The agricultural committee of the Board of Trade met on Monday evening, and took up that matter of the loss of the Kingston Dairy School. J. W. Bell presided and introduced representatives from the Kingston District Milk Producers Association, who requested the Board of Trade to cooperate in making representations to the Ontario government urging the immediate rebuilding of the school. As a result the following were appointed: J. M. Campbell, president, A. M. Rankin, M.P.P., J. W. Bell, chairman of the agricultural committee, Mayor S. S. Corbett, Ald. W. P. Peters, chairman of the city industries committee, W. W. Sands, F. Murton, Joseph McGrath, and two representatives from Queen's University. This strong committee will act in cooperation with county councils of Frontenac, Lennox and Addington and when arrangements for an interview with the Hon. Mr. Doherty, minister of agriculture, have been made by A. M. Rankin, M.P.P., the party will proceed to Toronto and present the case for the Kingston District Milk Producers Association.

### INTERESTING LIQUOR CASE

To Be Decided by Police Magistrate—Case Against Chinamen Dismissed.

An interesting point cropped up in the hearing of a liquor case at police court Tuesday morning.

A young man was charged with "trafficking in liquor," and through his counsel, T. J. Rigney, pleaded "not guilty." It was alleged that the young fellow carried a bottle of liquor to a certain home in the city, where a portion of it was consumed. Mr. Rigney held that no offence had been committed. There had been no money transaction and the liquor had been secured on an order in a legitimate way.

The magistrate remarked that the liquor had been taken from one place to another.

Mr. Rigney stated that decisions on this point had been given on both sides.

The magistrate will give his decision on Thursday.

The charge against Lee Tam of being the keeper of a disorderly house at 88 William street, and that against Lee Hung and Mrs. Charlotte Carfield, of being frequenters, were dismissed as there was no evidence to form a conviction. Magistrate Ferrell had this to say to the young woman: "You yourself realize the position you have placed yourself in, and I hope you have friends who will look after you, and that you will never get into trouble of this kind again."

The accused left the court room under the care of the police matron and later was escorted to a train for Toronto.

The charge against William Bates is that he did, on July 11th, have liquor "in a place other than a private dwelling." The case will be heard a week hence.

### LEFT MONEY TO CHURCH.

A Former Teacher in the Kingston Public Schools.

In the will of the late Mrs. Lillie Maybee, who for some years was on the teaching staff of the Board of Education, the sum of \$200 was handed over to the boards of Sydenham street Methodist church and asked that \$100 be given to the Social Service and Evangelism Department of the Methodist church and \$100 is for the Women's Missionary Society of Sydenham street church. Mrs. Maybee came to Kingston some years ago for the purpose of educating her two boys, who later graduated from the School of Science at Queen's University. After the graduation of her younger son she resigned her position on the Kingston teaching staff and left the city. About six months ago she died.

### Meeting of the Cabinet.

Ottawa, Jan. 24.—The first meeting of the cabinet is scheduled for this afternoon, when it is expected there will be a discussion as to the calling of parliament, the legislative programme to be submitted and other questions in regard to which attention has been attracted by the by-elections.

All but ten constituencies have made returns of the election results on Dec. 6 to the director-general of elections.
